State's Senior Senator On The Third Term

In 1928, speaking in support of the well-known resolution passed then by the United States Senate in regard to a third term, Senator George Norris, of Nebraska, said in part: "If a President of the United States were allowed to renominate himself, as he could, it would mean ultimately the establishment in this country of a monarchy upon the ruins of our present republican form of government."

"A President wishing to be renominated... after he has been in office for some time, can compel his party to renominate him... He nominates himself by using the instrumentality that the law gives him on account of his position. There is no competition. That is always injurious; that is always detrimental to a free country."

"Suppose Coolidge is a saint... Still that is no argument why this resolution should not be adopted, and that is no reason why we should not prevent, if we can, Presidents from being elected to a third term."

Boy Scouts Embarking On An Extensive Program

The nation's 1,429,622 Boy Scouts, Cubs, Senior Scouts and adult leaders are now embarking on an intensive program in an effort "to make as substantial a contribution as is humanly possible to further strengthen and invigorate our democracy."

A detailed "program of action" released by Dr. James E. West, Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, has been received by the Covered Wagon Council which has jurisdiction for the Scout Movement in the following counties: Antelope, Boone, Boyd, Brown, Burt, Cedar, Cherry, Colfax, Cuming, Dakota, Dixon, Dodge, Douglas, Holt, Keya Paha, Knox, Madison, Nance, Pierce, Platte, Rock, Sarpy, Saunders, Stanton, Thurston, Washington, Wayne.

The program, according to Mr. Harrold Alvord, Scout Executive of the Covered Wagon Council, involves the strengthening of every individual Troop, Cub Pack and Senior Scouting Unit in preparation for whatever service opportunities lie ahead. New groups will be organized, enabling more boys to become Scouts and thus increasing the number of those trained for service. Test surveys through the years, Scout Officials point out, have shown that three out of every four boys of Scout age intensely desire to become Scouts. The number of existing Troops has never been large enough to meet this membership need.

Troops are being urged to recruit to full strength of 32 Scouts if the available leadership is adequate to the responsibility. In some cases this will mean the addition of one or two trained adult leaders.
