Evidently Does Not Like The Administration

O'Neill, Nebraska, October 29, 1940

We are living in a great spending age that reaches from the White House down.

A survey is now being made to abandon Highway No. 20, recently surfaced, and buy a right of way and build an entirely new road from the center of the west side of O'Neill to the railroad, thence along its right-of-way to a point west of Emmet, where No. 20, as it is now, joins the railroad right of way.

We are for new roads and good roads when they open up new communities or serve old ones better, or when they eliminate dangerous turns, bad hills, etc., but the proposed change will do neither. At no place will the new road be more than a mile and a half from the present location. A well graded curve at the corner on the west side of O'Neill and another at Danceland corner, and the present highway runs straight west to the railroad right-of-way, where the new road will join it.

The country benefits but little in the way of labor, materials used, or what the country produces in the making of new highways. Most of the work is done by contractors with great machines that require skilled labor.

Much work and expense has gone into the present highway. With the delinquent tax list running in relays for publication in our papers, it looks like we need officials all
