"The Flower Song" was played as a piano solo by Beth Billings. The audience was led in the singing of "America" by Mrs. Evans.

There were 2 addresses, "Lincoln's Gettysburg Address," which was read by Walter L. Sievers, and an address on the theme, "The Roll of Honor," by Rev. C. Donald Vogel, pastor of the Ewing United Presbyterian church and an ex-Navy chaplain. Rev. C. W. Gossard, pastor of the Ewing Free Methodist Church, gave the invocation prayer and pronounced the benediction. Lyle P. Dierks, commander of Sanders post, presided.

In his address, Rev. Vogel appealed for a "remembrance of the war heroes which is not just sorrow, but more so a dedication to the task of making freedom bring forth fruit worthy of their sacrifice." He stated that those who died did not raise the question of the worthiness of the Nation for which they died, or the question of the justification of the war which they had been fighting.

30 Witness Aerial Spraying Exhibition

ATKINSON—Thirty farmers and ranchers witnessed the aerial spraying (or "dusting") exhibition Saturday at the Frank Brady place 2 miles south and a half-mile east of Atkinson. The 17-acre barley field was sprayed from an aircraft for rag weed control.

The demonstration followed a conference held the night before in Memorial hall.

After being postponed several times because of threatened rain, the exhibition was finally staged shortly after the noon hour.

Most observers were impressed with the results from the low-flying aircraft. One tree in the middle of the field was effectively enveloped with a "fog."
