

Helmer Collects 18 Strikeouts Off Page

O'Neill Rockets Win 7-2 to Capture First-Half Laurels in Holt League

PAGE—Danny Helmer & Co. put on a daylight fireworks show at Page Sunday, the Fourth of July, and obliterated Page hopes for first-half honors in the Holt county baseball league race. The O'Neill Rockets, unbeaten thus far in league play, won 7-2.

A Page victory would have tied the 2 clubs for first-half laurels, but a win wasn't in the deck against Hot-Rock Helmer and his companions. Mr. Helmer disposed of 18 Page batsmen via the strikout process.

It was a ding-dong ball game up until the eighth, O'Neill leading 3-2. Lloyd Cork, Page's 31-year-old veteran hurler, had to leave in the fifth because of a sick tummy, which might have been caused by too much Fourth of July watermelon or too much heat.

Cork was pitching effective ball until he went to the showers. He had yielded 6 hits, had struck out 3 and had walked none in 5 innings. Darrell Graham, Cork's substitute, immediately walked 2. When he got his pitches under control the Rockets touched off their favorite brand of firecrackers.

In the last half of the sixth, Mr. Helmer began to turn on the heat—disregarding the fact that Ol' Sol had already made things hot enough. He whiffed Bob Appleby, Kenny Heiss and Don Heiss in succession.

In O'Neill's half of the seventh, Left Fielder Ed Schmidt fouled out to Catcher Haynes. Ralph Larson, Page third, made a wild throw to first, but the runner, Ed Morrow, was tagged at second. Helmer struck out and that ended the half.

Mr. Helmer quickly disposed of Fielder Melcher, Third Larson and Short Darrell Heiss in the last half of the seventh. In the eighth, Kelly Saindon, O'Neill shortstop, and Second Kenny Ellington were issued walks by Mr. Graham. Tomjack struck out but Gene Wolfe, centerfielder, drove a grounder up the third base line that was muffed by Page's left fielder, Ken Heiss. Saindon scoring and Ellington advancing to third. Milo Gorgen, O'Neill right fielder, poked a double into center field, scoring Ellington and Wolfe and the Page cause was lost in the explosion. Dick Tomlinson fled out to second and Gorgen raced home on Ed Schmidt's single to cen-

ter field. Schmidt advanced to third on Morrow's grounder to right field, and Helmer's strikeout ended the scoring.

Page tried desperately to score again, but Haynes and Graham both struck out. In fielding an infield fly Ellington forgot the glue and Fred Appleby got on safely. Bob Appleby grounded to short but was thrown out at first, retiring the side.

In the first half of the ninth, Saindon was thrown out at first and Ellington singled. Tomjack hit safely to short left field and Ellington advanced to second. Wolfe hit an infield fly, but the Page shortstop caught Ellington at second, retiring the side.

A large crowd witnessed the game on the Page playground, a half-mile south of town. One of the hottest days of the year, the players on both sides complained bitterly of the heat—not to mention the customers, who clung to the shade of the trees that lined the sides of the diamond.

The Page crew had been pointing to O'Neill for weeks, but the brand of ball that had jolted the Rockets had been played the week before against Ainsworth. Ainsworth had beaten Page, 2-1, but Page had out-hit Ainsworth, 8-2. The Page crew evidenced lack of experience in competing against the veteran Rockets.

Cork, Haynes and Melcher were the only Page batsmen that could touch Helmer. Cork rang up 2 doubles, Melcher 2 singles and Haynes 1 double. For O'Neill, the elongated Mr. Schmidt and Tomjack slapped out triples and Gene Wolfe turned in doubles.

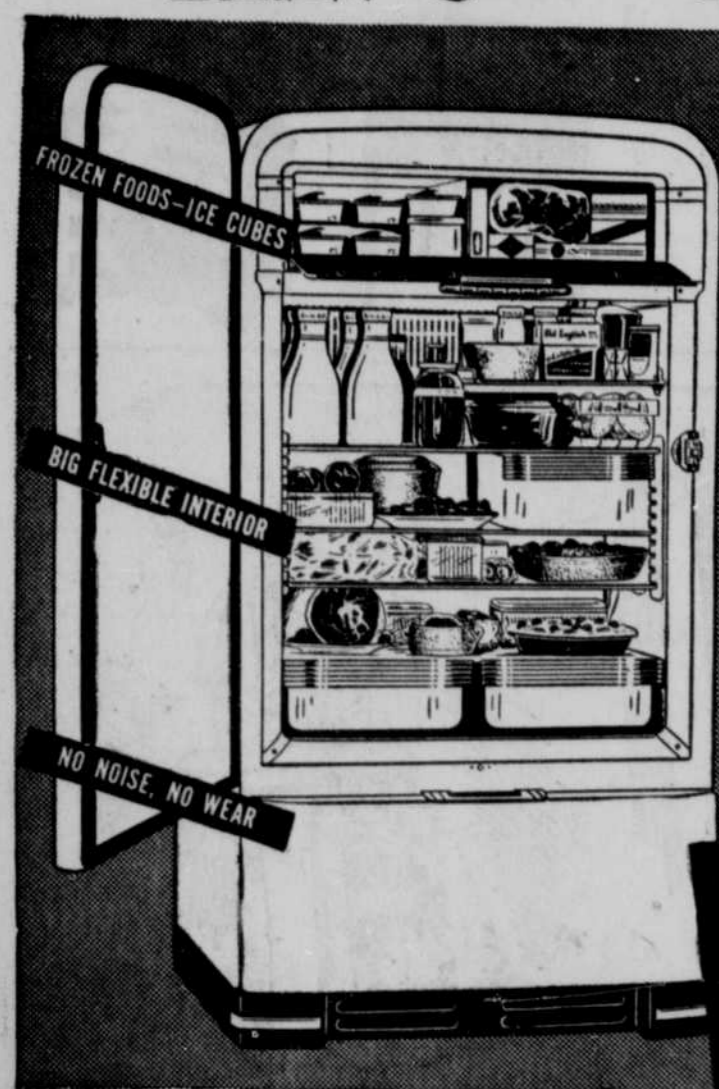
