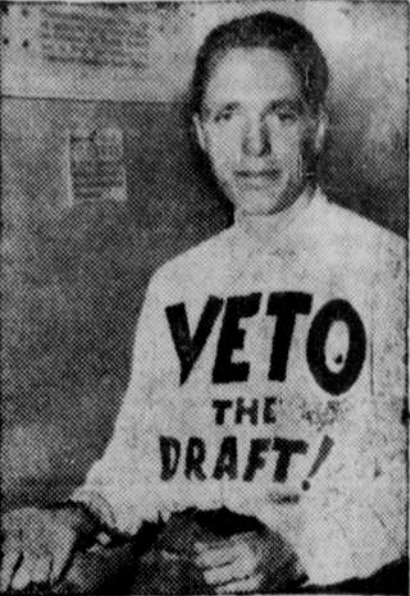

## Third Regiment Wined and Dined by Good Citizens of Nashville, Tenn.

**50 YEARS AGO**  
July 21, 1898

O. C. Bates was down from Atkinson last week in attendance at the Democratic convention. Democrats were so scarce that the Colonel spent the greatest part of his time seeking a microscope in order to look for the O'Neill Democrats. Before evening he found a couple. They held their convention and the Colonel returned home happy and contented.

According to the Nashville, Tenn., papers the members of the Third regiment Nebraska Volunteer infantry were wined and dined by the citizens of that city while on their way to Jacksonville, Fla.

After dining the boys the pretty Southern lassies pinned a bouquet of roses on the coat of each soldier and report says that many of the boys expressed the wish that they might be allowed to remain in Nashville, but the fortunes of war would not allow it and they left with longing, pleasant memories and souvenirs of the beautiful southern city and its people.
