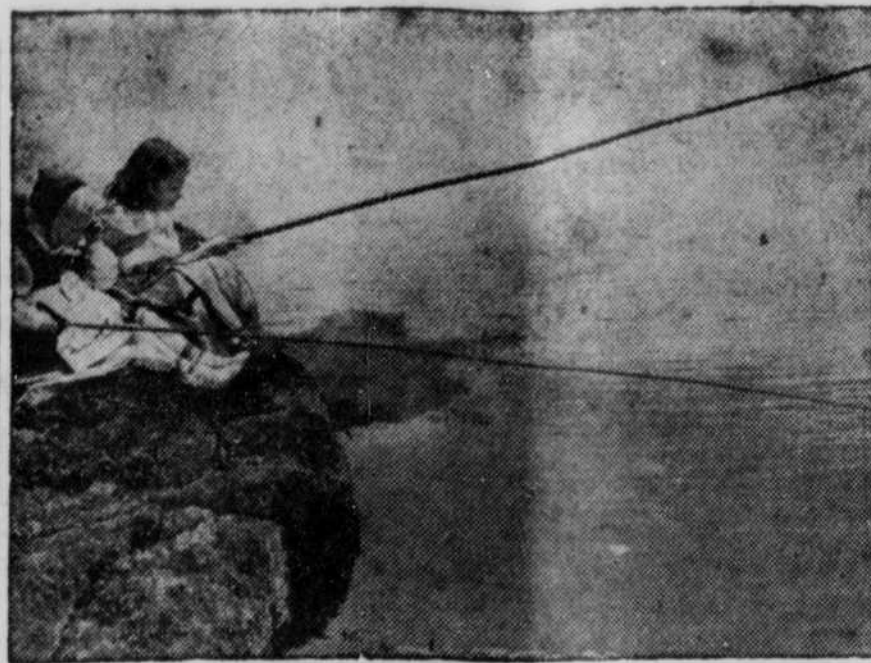

Plow Terrace Entries Sought

The soil conservation district office here received word this week of the state plow terrace contest that will be held on the Frank Murphy farm 6 miles south of Battle Creek, on Tuesday, August 17.

The Holt district will be allotted 1 or more contestants. Arrangements may be made to have the desired kind of plow and tractor furnished or the contestant may use his own equipment.

Contestants will be judged on cross section area of channel, tillability of terrace, uniformity of grade and alignment and efficiency. Prizes include first \$50 E bond; 2d, \$25 E bond; 3d \$15 cash. 4th \$10 cash; all other contestants \$5 cash.

Any farm operator using farm tractor and mold board plow is eligible. The district urges anyone having experience in mold board plow terrace construction to submit applications to the office in O'Neill before July 28.

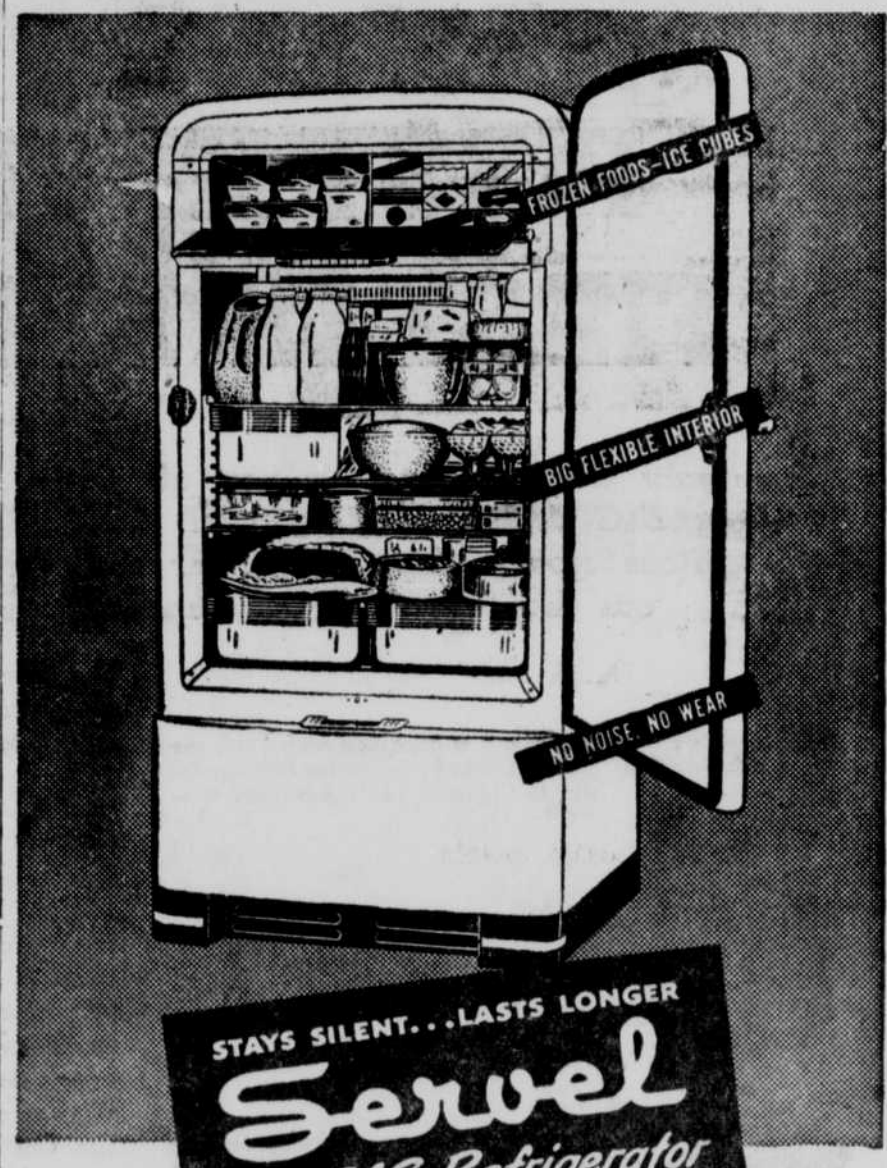
