

ROCKETS WIN IN MERRY-GO-ROUND

Atkinson Towners Are Dumped 15-13, Plunging Race into a Tie

Hurling Unimpressive

ATKINSON — The O'Neill Rockets came to town Sunday with a scant quorum—9 men only—and spilled the Holt league-leading Towners 15-13 in a weird baseball game.

The proceedings more closely resembled a bunch of kids on a merry-go-round than good baseball, but the customers—and there were many—found the entertainment worth the chips.

Atkinson employed 4 pitchers, but the Rockets exploded in the faces of all of them. O'Neill used 2 pitchers and they were equally hard hit.

Jerry Troshynski started, Doc Mancuso and Ed Scott made short-lived relief tries, and Bill Troshynski, the veteran of dozens of O'Neill-Atkinson feuds, finished. Only 2 Rockets went down swinging.

Kenny Ellington went 6 innings for the winners, was hit hard, and struckout only 4. Danny Helmer took over, whiffed 3.

Catcher Ted Tomjack had a fat day at bat. He connected for a homerun, 2 triples and a single. Fielder Gene Wolfe didn't fare too badly. He slipped out 2 triples and a single.

Dick Godel, the youngster on the O'Neill team, got 2 hits, including a triple with the bases loaded. Wolfe snagged a sensational catch with the bases loaded and short-

circuited an Atkinson bid for points.

The victory was the 13th of the season for the Rockets, who have dropped only 3.

The O'Neill win plunged the second-half Holt league race into a tie between O'Neill and Atkinson. A playoff is planned. (See story elsewhere on this page.)

ATKINSON-O'NEILL IN PLAY-OFF HERE

New Lights in Carney Park to Be Baptized in Title Play

The new lights in Carney park, recently installed as a result of a Summer-long movement, will be formally used for the first time Sunday night, August 29, when Atkinson and O'Neill clash for a tie game. The clubs are tied for second-half laurels in the Holt county league by virtue of O'Neill's 15-13 win Sunday for the Atkinson Towners.

An Atkinson victory would send the Holt county title chase into a tie with the O'Neill Rockets—first-half winners. An O'Neill win would clinch the season's crown for the Rockets.

The second-half title will be settled in a 1-game series while a 3-game series would be required to settle league honors if a playoff is required between the winners of each half.

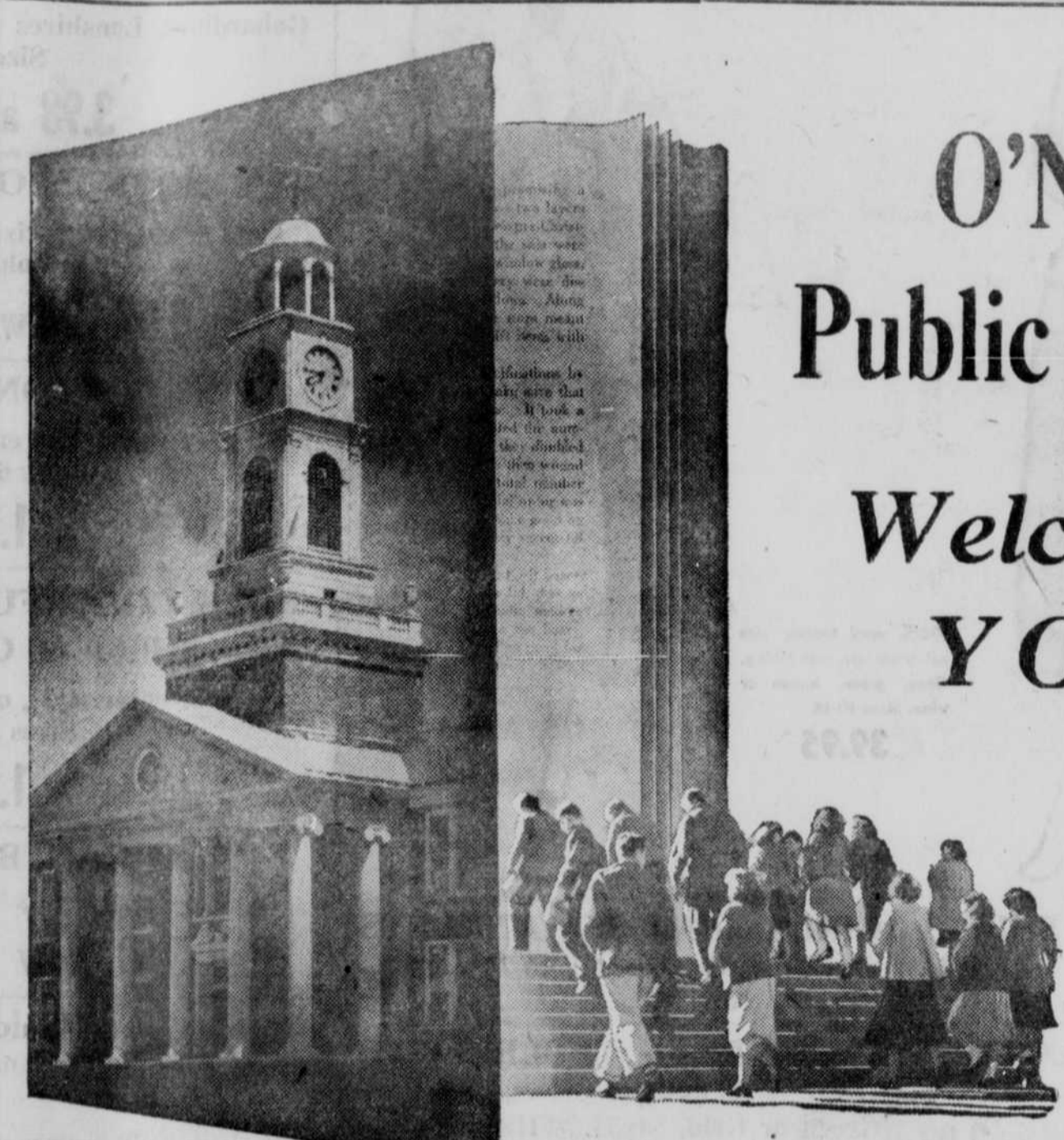
