Out of Old Nebraska —

'U' Hall, Condemned As Physically Unfit from Its Beginning, Is Being Torn Down

Old and decrepit "U" hall, the first building ever erected on the University of Nebraska campus, is being torn down this month to make way for a modern engineering building. Rather, what's left of it is being torn down. The two upper stories and bell tower were razed in 1925, and recent generations of students have known only the crumbling flat-topped, one-story structure standing among the trees of the old campus like the base of a toppled monument in some ancient cemetery.

Actually, the building was condemned as physically unfit from its very beginning, and it had to undergo extensive repairs. The original foundation of soft brown sandstone was replaced with a limestone foundation. In its later years the building was held together by steel cables.

The rickety nature of the original building long delayed appropriations for additional construction on the University campus.

In the first place, it absorbed a great deal of money in repairs. In the second place, it was a convenient target for those who wanted to remove the institution from Lincoln.

The building saw its first student generation in the Fall of 1871. A photo in the files of the State Historical society, taken that year, shows it as a gaunt, ugly structure incongruously rising out of the open prairie. It stood at the north end of Lincoln's 11th street, dominating the skyline of the raw, new capital city.

In his first report to the board of regents, made in 1872, Chancellor Allen R. Benton stated, "some difficulty has been experienced in making the roof impervious to rain." This difficulty has continued to be experienced, and buckets to catch water were standard equipment of the departments using the building this Summer.

Another perennial difficulty was that of heating the building. In the early days, the classrooms and chapel were heated by stoves. This system worked fairly well for the classrooms, but it never was satisfactory for the chapel. Further describing the chapel, he said: "With its wealth of one historian of the university bleak walls, its stained and perilous ceiling, a more uninspiring room cannot well be
