

Consumers Contracts Total \$180,073

Bids were received and opened Tuesday, August 17, at the general office of Consumers Public Power district in Columbus on substations and other equipment to be installed in connection with the new 115,000-volt transmission line now under construction between Norfolk, Neligh and O'Neill.

Low bids on the 4 groups of equipment included in the proposal totaled \$180,073.75, with escalator clauses to provide for increases in prices up to 20 percent.

Railway and Industrial Engineering company, of Greensburg, Pa., was low with a bid of \$63,450.30, on the 4 outdoor steel substations which included a 69,000-volt substation for O'Neill, a 115,000-volt substation for Neligh, a 34,500-volt substation for Norfolk.

The General Electric company and the Graybar company, both of Omaha, submitted identical bids of \$29,868.00, which were the lowest bids received on the control and relay cubicles for controlling circuit breakers on the transmission lines at O'Neill, Neligh and Norfolk.

Allis Chalmers Manufacturing company, of Omaha, with a bid of \$53,589.00, was low bidder on outdoor switchgear for the 3 locations and the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company, of Omaha, submitted the low bid of \$33,166.45 on lightning arresters and current and potential transformers for installation at the 3 locations.

Dates of delivery on the various items specified in the bids ranged from 10 months on the switchgear to approximately a year on the 4 substation structures.

Equipment covered by the bids is to be installed at the various locations when the new line is completed and connected for 115,000-volt operation.

Officials of Consumers district said it is expected that the line will be completed some time this fall and will be operated at 33,000 volts temporarily to provide an additional power supply for the area until substations and other equipment is received and installed to provide for operation at the full 115,000 volts.

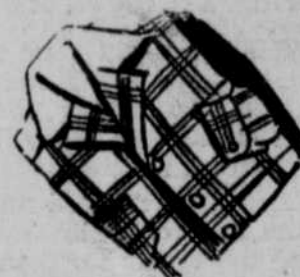
