An all-out crackdown on housing frauds against veterans was ordered by Atty. Gen. Tom Clark and Housing Expediter Tighe Woods at a conference of U. S. district attorneys from 21 key cities.

"I want you to put these housing frauds at the top of the list when it comes to prosecutions," ordered the attorney general.

Equally vigorous w a s Woods, who has expanded his investigating force from 15 to 300 men. He told the district attorneys in their closed-door session that while he would leave the legal justification up to them, he wanted to emphasize the government's moral obligation to do something about housing violations.
