Soil District to Harvest Grass Seed

Supervisors of the Holt Soil
 Conservation district are mak-
 ing plans to harvest native
 grass seed, according to Chair-
 man Louis Bernholtz.

The district supervisors will
 pay a certain rate per acre or
 per pound for the right to har-
 vest the seed on a share basis.
 The rate to be paid will de-
 pend on the amount of seed
 set in the heads, the kind of
 grass, the thickness of stand,
 the kind and amount of weeds
 or weedy grasses and the size
 of the field.

Any farmer who has a field
 of any of the native grasses
 which he thinks would be suit-
 able for harvesting and would
 be interested in having it har-
 vested should drop a card to
 supervisors, Holt soil conserva-
 tion district, box 511, O'Neill,
 or contact one of the supervi-
 sors, Louis Bernholtz, E. J. Re-
 vell, David E. Bowen or F. E.
 Keys. Farmers may also leave
 word at the county agent's of-
 fice or the soil conservation
 district office.

 ingly impossible things?

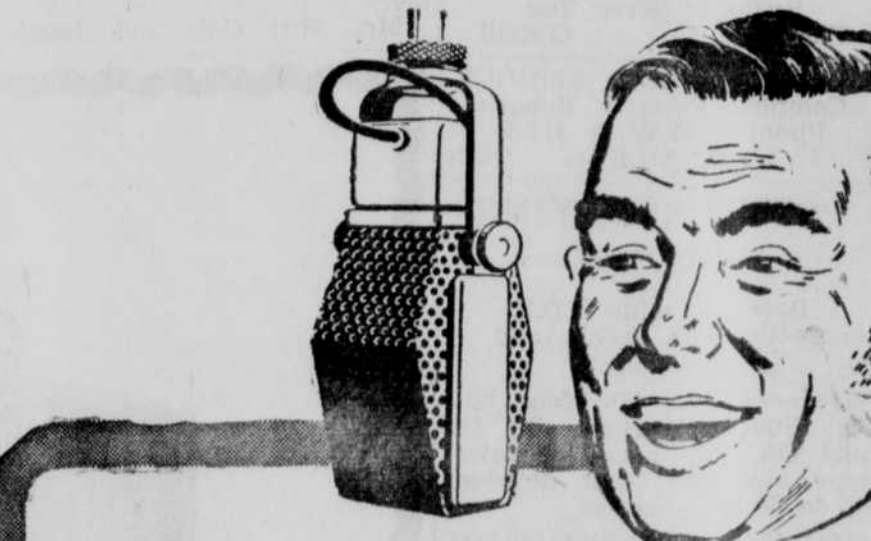
John McHugh has ordered

Record Corn Crop Favors Range Man

Growers of range feeder
 livestock now have the govern-
 ment's word for it that this
 year the Cornbelt will have
 corn to feed. The government's
 estimate on the 1948 corn crop
 last week was a record-smash-
 ing 3 1/2 billion bushels.

At the same time, another
 department of agriculture re-
 port indicated that Cornbelt
 feedlots could do with a lot of
 restocking. The number of
 cattle on feed in 11 Cornbelt
 states on August 1 was down
 12 percent from a year ago,
 and at the second lowest level
 in the records.

Only time cattle on feed
 August 1 were fewer, said
 the government, was in 1946,
 and then that was due to
 abnormally heavy July mar-
 ketings following lifting of
 price controls.

Biggest decrease in cattle on
 feed August 1 among various
 states was in Iowa and Ne-
 braska, where the reduction
 was 26 and 25 percent, respec-
 tively. South Dakota showed
 a 10 percent drop. Only Kan-
 sas, up 10 percent, reversed
 the general trend.

Taken together, the overall
 prospect, a record corn crop
 on top and feedlots that can
 do with a lot of restocking, is
 odo with a lot of restocking, is
 timism of the range livestock
 grower regarding the market-
 ing season just getting under
 way.

'Ak' to Issue Grain Award

The Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben,
 of Omaha, have announced a
 new project designed to en-
 courage crop improvement
 practices and training among
 4-H club members and voca-
 tional agricultural students in
 Nebraska.

The project will be conduct-
 ed in cooperation with the Ne-
 braska Grain Improvement as-
 sociation and the Nebraska ag-
 ricultural extension service.
 Contest winners, including 8
 exhibitors and the leaders of
 the highest-scoring club mem-
 ber and Future Farmer entry,
 will be awarded a 1-day all-
 expense trip to Omaha for a
 recognition luncheon and tour
 of grain marketing and pro-
 cessing facilities.

The program is open to
 youths enrolled in small grain
 (wheat, oats, barley or rye)
 projects for the current year.
 Each exhibitor must grow at
 least 5 acres of grain, plant
 certified seed, keep a complete
 record of field operations and
 cost of project, and must main-
 tain complete management of
 the project.

Scoring will be based on
 approved practices, records,
 yield per acre and grain qual-
 ity. Ak-Sar-Ben will award
 certificates to each youth par-
 ticipating in the project. The
 highest-ranking individual in
 each county will be awarded a
 special citation. Other details
 on the project may be secured
 from Nebraska county agents
 and Ak-Sar-Ben ambassadors.
 The project is being directed
 by J. C. Swinbank.
