

ATKINSON COPS 2d HALF CROWN

O'Neill Rockets Subdued 5-4 in First Game Under Arcs Here

An estimated one thousand persons looked on Sunday night as the lights in Carney park, joining O'Neill on the south, were put into use for the first time and the Atkinson Towners made hay at the expense of the O'Neill Rockets.

Atkinson won 5-4 but only 2 of the victor's runs were earned and the Towners were out hit, 11-9.

The victory, however, clinched for Atkinson the second-half laurels in the split-season Holy county league race. O'Neill won the first half and the 2 teams will now clash in a 2-out-of-3 series for the season's championship.

Seven bobbles in the O'Neill infield boomed the Atkinson cause. Danny Helmer, chucking for O'Neill, set down 9 via the strikeout process. Twice he whiffed the talkative Jack Miller, Atkinson slugger; once with 2 aboard. The Helmer-Miller feud sparked the evening's entertainment.

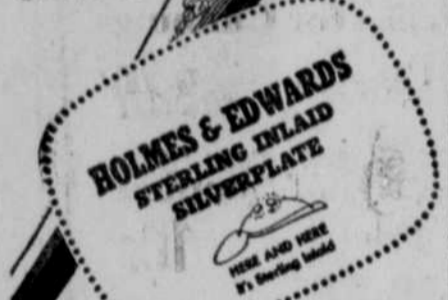
Bill Troshynski, the old faithful Atkinson hurler, struck out 3 and was liberal in yielding hits, but aged O'Neill baserunning cost several possible outs.

Jack Miller, of Atkinson, got a triple and a single to lead the winners' offensive, while Helmer got 2 singles and a triple to pace the O'Neill batting. Ed Schmidt, O'Neill infielder, got a single and a double, but was thrown out in attempting to stretch the double into a triple.
