

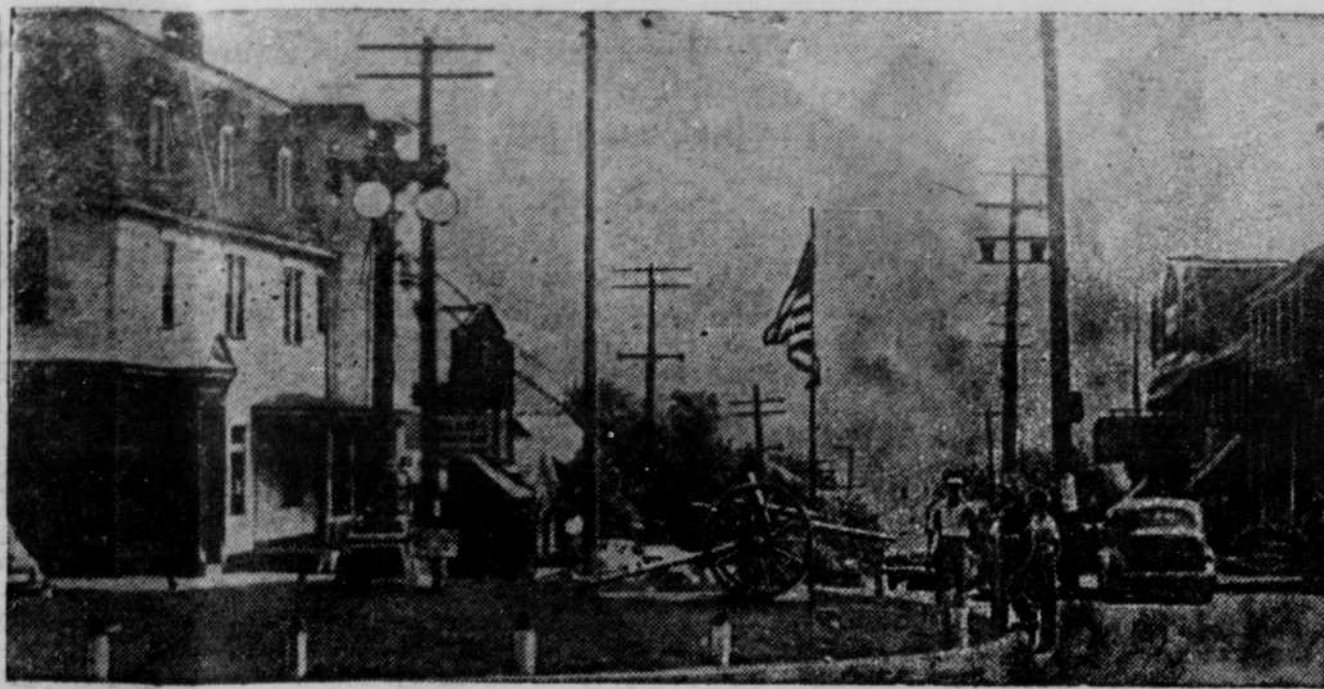


### OUTLOOK GOOD IN EAGLES' CAMP

Win from Page and Atkinson in 4-Team Competition

**CHAMBERS**—The O'Neill Rockets won the laurel in the baseball department at the fifty-sixth annual Holt county fair here last week. In a four-team intracounty tourney, the Rockets ousted Page in the semi-finals and turned back Atkinson in the finals.

**Atkinson 7; Chambers 5**  
 On Thursday—the first day—Atkinson defeated Chambers 7-5. Bill Troshynski chucked for the winners, and Clem Schrad hurled for Chambers. A bushel of Chambers errors proved costly.

**O'Neill 13; Page 12**  
 On Friday, O'Neill and Page tangled with hired pitchers doing the mound labors. Marshall Kryss, of Creighton, started for O'Neill, and Gail George, of Plainview, began for Page. George lasted only two frames and Kryss a little longer. Danny Helmer was the winning pitcher; Lloyd Cork the losing pitcher.

**O'Neill 11; Atkinson 10**  
 Pitcher Danny Helmer's circuit clout in the O'Neill half of the eleventh inning enabled the Rockets to eke out an 11-10 victory before a large crowd on the closing day of the fair.

Atkinson started Ed Scott on the mound, and he was relieved by Cecil Smith. Big Ed Schmidt opened in the box for O'Neill, later to be relieved in the fifth by Lloyd Cork, who, in turn, was replaced by Helmer.

He also has taught school in several Nebraska towns. Mrs. Ward will teach the eighth grade. All other vacancies are filled.

The new shop training teacher is Roger Engelbrecht, who comes from South Sioux City.

At St. Joseph's hall, school opened Wednesday morning with a total enrollment of 156 pupils. The number is only 6 fewer than last year's record-breaking enrollment.

The faculty in both the grade and high school is the same as that of last year.
