Out of Old Nebraska —

1859 Meeting of Peoples Party at Bellevue Looked Upon as First of GOP

In this political year of 1948, it is interesting to look back to the organization of political parties in Nebraska.

For about 5 years after the creation of Nebraska territory, there was no formal political party contest. Inasmuch as the Democratic party was in power nationally, all of the appointive territorial officers were members of that party. A majority of the residents probably were, also.

Prior to 1859, however, territorial elections were fought a long sectional rather than party lines. There was a bitter rivalry between the counties north of the Platte and those south of it, and this rivalry was a basic factor in territorial politics.

In August of 1859, though, both Democrats and Republicans held nominating conventions. The Democrats met at Plattsmouth on the 18th and the Republicans at Bellevue on the 24th.

The Republican party had only been in existence nationally about 5 years, and the Nebraska Republicans did not use the name in 1859. Instead, they called themselves the Peoples party. The leadership of the Peoples party, however, become the leadership of the territorial Republican party, and this Bellevue

meeting usually is looked upon as the first of the GOP in Nebraska.

The election of 1860 marks the first real contest in Nebraska between Democrats and Republicans as such. There was a great deal of confusion in Democratic ranks because then, as now, there were 2 Democratic candidates. Sen. Stephen A. Douglas, of Illinois, who might be referred to as the father of Nebraska territory, was the regular party candidate. The southerners, though, had bolted and had put up a candidate of their own, John C. Breckinridge, of Kentucky.

In the territory of Nebraska the principal contest was between J. Sterling Morton and Samuel G. Daily for the position of delegates to Congress. The race was close, and as was so frequently the case in connection with territorial elections the result was contested.

Both sides charged fraud, and both probably were right. Daily finally was seated although Morion probably had a plurality of the legally cast and legally counted ballots.

An interesting feature of early territorial politics was the role played by the newspapers. Almost every newspaper in the territory was a pronounced partisan organ. Moreover, the

editors didn't bother to confine their political views to the editorial page. Political news was reported in the same partisan manner in which editorials were written.

Indeed, it frequently is difficult to tell that stories in the various early papers are reporting the same political meeting.
