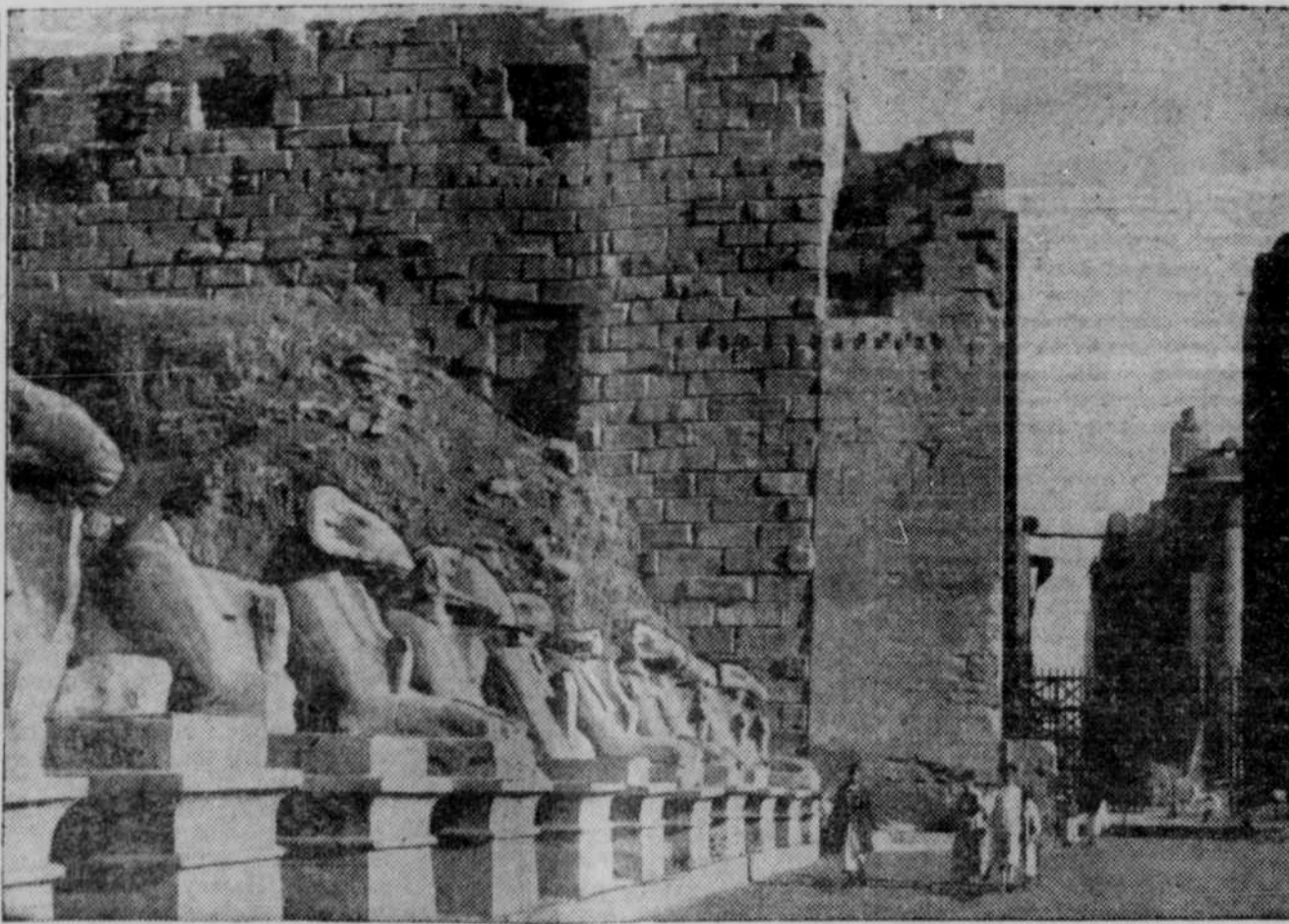

MILLENNIUMS OF RECONSTRUCTION . . . This is the avenue of ram-headed sphinxes at Karnak, Egypt. From ancient times repairs and reconstruction have been going on at Karnak. But despite the destruction of the centuries there is no other building in the world that can match the Temple of Amon at Karnak. The majestic edifices have been injured and rebuilt during the course of ages. Construction probably began with the era of the Pyramids, 5,000 years ago, and continued for almost 3,000 years. At the turn of the last century the flood of the Nile weakened the ground on which the Temple of Amon stands, and in 1899 many of the columns of the great Hall of Columns, one of the wonders of the world, fell.

OUT OF OLD NEBRASKA — Herald, February 4, 1860. The editor paid a visit to Omadi and recorded his impressions at considerable length for the benefit of his readers and posterity.

"Omadi," he wrote, "is situated on the banks of the Missouri and is a rather handsome location. The town has about 40 houses, nearly all of which are nice frame ones. Some of them are unoccupied as the former owners and occupants rushed frantically and furiously to Pikes Peak last spring and there became rich not very fast. Several thousand brick are piled up carefully for future use. A good store, store house, and warehouse adorn the central portion of the town."

According to the United States census, the population of Omadi in 1850 (the date the above was written) was 46. It does not appear in the enumeration of 1870, and the name has long since passed off the map of Nebraska.

The soil on which the town stood started long ago for the Gulf of Mexico by way of the Missouri. At the last reckoning, all that remained of the site was a sandbar jutting out from the Iowa side of the river.
