

## EWING TIGERS SET FOR NELIGH

New Mentor Conserves Manpower with Use of 'Dummies'

EWING—Ewing high school's football team is working hard these days getting in shape for the opening game with Neligh on Friday, September 17, under Neligh lights. An eight-game schedule is faced, five of which games will be played under the lights on the home field.

Eighteen men make up the squad this year, which, according to Oscar D. Smith, Ewing's new coach "doesn't allow for much reserve power." However, he is looking for Ewing to make its usual strong bid for the Cornbelt Conference cup.

Lining up for early practice sessions are the following men: In the backfield there are two veterans, Jack Pruden and Skippy Marquardt, with Don Dunaway and Dave Cloyd making strong bids for the ends. Tackles are veteran Fred Bollwitt and Eugene Kurpgewell, a promising newcomer to the squad. Bob Montgomery, who held down one of the guard posts last season, will be back in the same position. Jack Charvat and Bill Snider are competing for the other guard berth. Pat Sanders, named as Holt county center last season, will hold down that job with Jerry Rotherham serving as his relief. Reserves are John Binkerd, Vernon Rockey, Lyle Tucker, Max Angus and Tom Kazor.

In order to conserve

manpower, Coach Smith is using seven dummies for a "defense line" during scrimmages. He claimed that many colleges use this system to cut down on injuries and to conserve the power of the entire squad for when it is needed during games.

"Dummies don't bruise easily," he said, "and they can be just as tough to block."

This is Coach Smith's first year at Ewing. He came from Peru, where he was brushing up on his studies after returning from the Army. While at Peru he helped with the coaching at Peru Prep. He played four years of football for Peru and was on the football team of the 12th Armored division while in Germany.
