## EAGLES WIN OVER CREIGHTON, 18-7

### Purple Rebound After 3 Early Setbacks; Morrow Shines

Coach Marv Miller's O'Neill high Eagles hit the win column Friday night, downing Creighton 18-7 in Carney park here.

The Eagles were due to click after early season reversals handed them by Plainview, Bassett and Ewing in that order.

O'Neill's first touchdown came early. Creighton kicked to the Eagles and O'Neill drove to the Creighton 25 in a series of running plays. Quarterback Harold Elkins flipped a 10-yard pass to End Bob Erwin, who ran 15 yards to score.

O'Neill led 6-0 at intermission.

In the third period, the Eagles blasted away at Creighton's right side. Fullback Rudy Morrow slanted off right tackle after a fake reverse and he rambled 60 yards down the sidelines to score.

Creighton scored on a fake pass from the O'Neill 10. Gordon Gentzler, fleet and handy back who handled most of Creighton's heavy ball handling, did the job.

O'Neill's third counter resulted from a fumble. Lineman Duane Borg recovered a Creighton fumble after an O'Neill kick. A Creighton defender batted an O'Neill pass into the arms of End Don Wagman, who continued goalward and scored handily.

The Eagles were obliged to punt on only two occasions and outplayed their opposition all evening.

The Gentzler to Harold Lane pass combination was a thorn in the Eagles' side, however.

Several times the long, fleet-footed Lane worked himself behind the O'Neill secondary and occasionally Pitcher Gentzler hit his mark. The Creighton touchdown was set up on a pass that netted nearly 40 yards.

Tackles Chuck Marston and Tiny Layh stood out in the O'Neill line, while Morrow's running and Frosh Back Don Calkins' kicking looked good in O'Neill's backfield.

## TIGERS EKE 7-6 WIN OVER BALERS

### Pruden's Placekick Gives Ewing a Narrow Win from Atkinson

ATKINSON—Ewing Tigers went hunting for a football victory at Atkinson Friday evening and were able to win a 7-6 victory over the Atkinson Balers.

Both teams scored in the second half, the Balers making their touchdown early in the third quarter when White took a neat hand-off from Osbourne and scampered 25 yards for a score.

The Tigers crossed Atkinson's goal toward the end of the game after a sustained drive from their own 30-yard line. Sanders carried the ball over from the three.

The outcome of the game was decided by Pruden's placekick for the extra point, with Cloyd holding the ball. Atkinson's attempt to make the extra point failed.

During the first half both sides played defensive ball. Ewing was in a position to score in the first quarter, but Atkinson drove the Tigers back from the 3-yard line and then took advantage of a fumble by Ewing on the 12 to prevent a score. Play in the second half was lively. Both sides opened up with some brilliant deception, some powerful off-tackle drives and some fast end runs.

Osbourne made several long runs for Atkinson, while Sanders and Pruden of Ewing carried the ball to Atkinson's goal mostly by picking up three to five yards at a time.

Only two minutes and 20 seconds remained in the game after Ewing's touchdown. Atkinson used that time well and the Balers were moving fast toward Ewing's goal when Rollwitz intercepted a pass on the 35.

The game ended with Ewing in possession of the ball in mid-field.

Ewing made 12 first downs rushing to Atkinson's six. Ewing was awarded one first down on a penalty and picked one up on a pass from Sanders to Bennett.

Neither side had much success with passes. Atkinson seemed set for Cloyd on reverses and stopped him cold every time, except one gain of 20 yards and another for five. Ewing had three passes intercepted and Atkinson had two intercepted. Penalties were about even except for a penalty against Ewing for 15 yards for pushing.

The two teams are coached by Smiths. Randall Smith is coach at Atkinson, while Oscar Smith is coach at Ewing.
