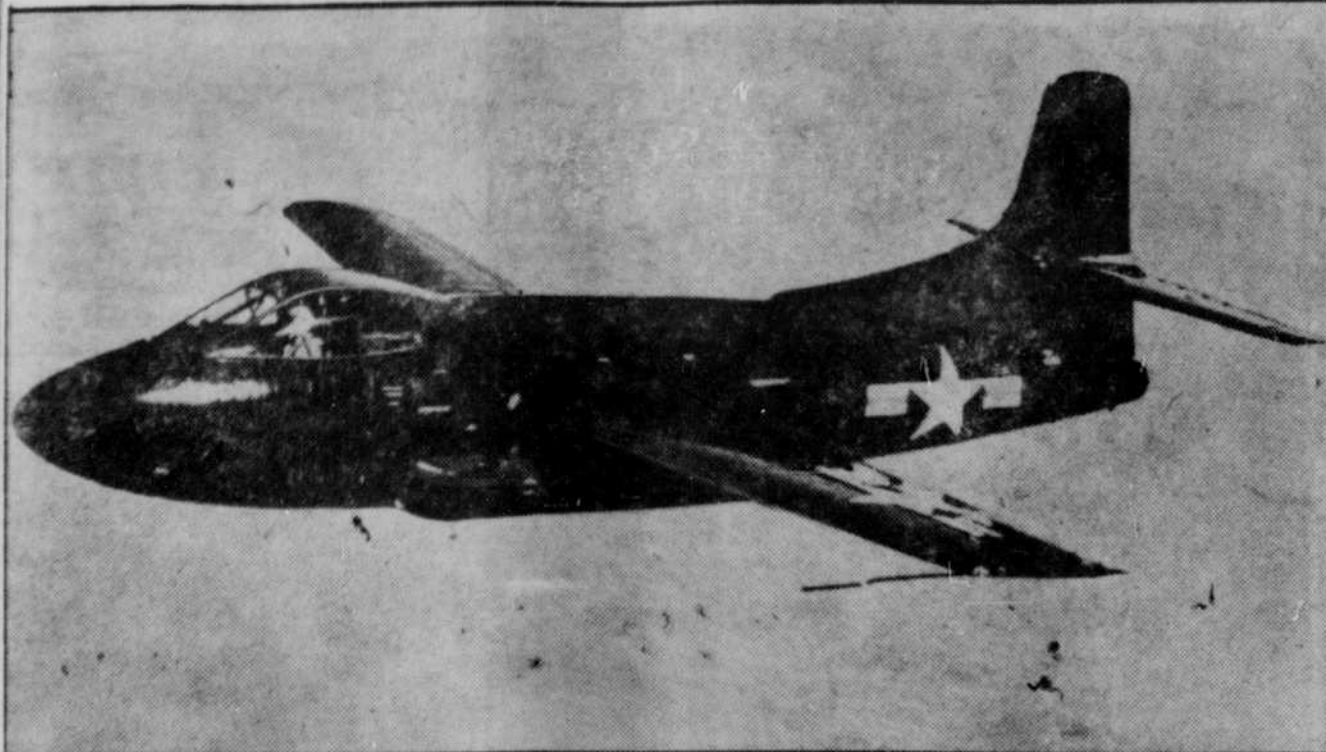
CDA Receives 15 New Members


