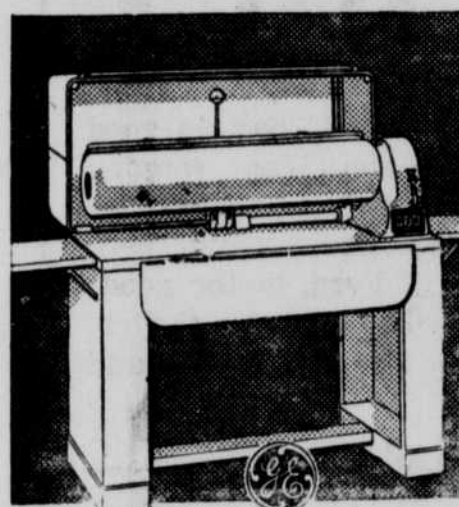
We held our meeting at Betty Harmon's home Wednesday evening, October 14. We had a lovely lunch and would like to thank Mrs. Harmon.

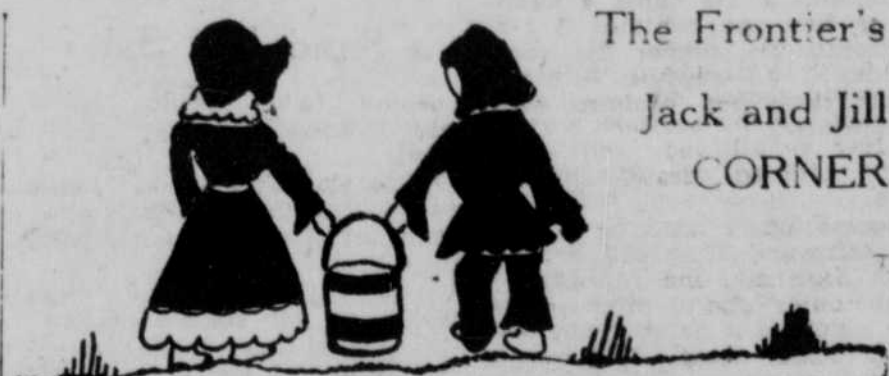
