> In the Sixth district, George E. Collins, Republican incum-bent, is opposed by A. M. Bat-enohrst, Democrat. Voters in the following precincts will decide on these two men: Stuart, Green Valley, Holt Creek, Francis, Swan and Josie.

Voters will decide "for" or 'against" a porposed constitutional amendment to "authorize the state legislature to impose a tax on reservations of mineral rights and fissionable material in land and royal-

They will also have an opportunity to say "yes" or "no" to a bonus proposal in behalf of World War II veterans. The proposal would authorize a three and one-half mill levy upon all taxable property in the state, except intangible property, for the years 1949 to 1953, inclusive.

A bonus, amounting to an average of \$300 per veteran, would be paid in 1954, according to the proposed law. The Veterans of Foreign Wars has been backing the proposal.

The bonus proposal provides that members of the armed forces during World War II are to be paid \$10 for each month of service in this coun-try and \$15 a month for each month served overseas. However, no veteran may receive more than \$350.

Thirty-four million dollars is the estimated figure the taxpayers will have to dig up during the next five years if they want to pay the bonus. Payment would begin in July, 1954, and continue for a year.

The levy for the bonus and aid fund would be more than one-half of the total state levy

for all purposes To carry, the proposal must receive a majority vote. The law also requires that 35 percent of the people voting in the general election must vote on the issue.

Republican candidates names will appear first on the ballot. This is because that party collected the greatest number of ballots at the last election.

The purpose of CROP is to feed the hungry, speed reha-bilitation, and build toward a 53 Head covering better world.

Reverend Gerber, w h o is in charge of the publicity in the county, explained that all churches in the nation, including Jewish organizations, are cooperating in the movement. He point-ed out that distribution overseas of the CROP gifts will be handled through church agencies.

"The administrators are competent and experienced and they know where the greatest need is," he explain-

Reverend Ihrig commented that he is frequently asked the question: Where does Mar-shall plan aid leave off and CROP aid begin? He explained that he was

curious about that same ques-tion until he was brought into the CROP movement.

"The American government determines how much aid military and otherwise-must be extended to a given European nation to prevent the colapse of its economy. Food provided through government aid to other governments is not relief as we, in America, understand the meaning of the word," the Atkinson clergy-man continued.

"It goes through the regular channels of trade and it is bought by those who have the money to buy. Because of the scarcity, some is diverted to the black market, since there is more profit in selling at prices above the ceiling set by the government.

"There is no conflict be tween government aid to other governments and Church Re-lief to individuals. Both are needed.

A large part of Church Relief food will be used in institutional feeding, especially for orphanages, for hospitals and homes for aged.
