Duck Hunting Good for Many

Nebraska's 1948 duck season, to date, has been most successful for many hunters. Sportsmen in the sandhill and eastern region, not only were treated to a pleasurable flight of ducks and small geese, which has kept enthusiastic hunter busy the past week, but western hunters also have been surprised by a favorable flight in their areas.

The larger, so-called Canada Mallards and Canada geese have not entered into the pictures yet to any degree although several reports have been received by the game commission on kills of Canada geese.

The sandhills area and basin area in the east, as well as portions of the Missouri river, have been very profitable hunting so far.

Veteran nimrods in the O'Neill vicinity, who know where to hunt, have been successful consistently since the season opened.

Transient hunters, lacking intimate knowledge of the terrain, have not been so successful.
