

LARGE CROWD AT CROWE FUNERAL

Well-Known Holt Woman Ardent Supporter of Children's Home

Burial at Niobrara

LYNCH — Funeral services for Mrs. Jane Crowe, 86, well-known north-Holt county resident, were held Tuesday, October 26, at the Lynch Wesleyan Methodist church with Rev. Morris Budensick, the pastor, in charge. A large crowd attended the services.

She died in Sacred Heart hospital in Lynch on Saturday, October 23, following a lingering illness.

Pallbearers were: Howard Graham, Lloyd Tuch, James Tuch, Melvin Tuch, Harold Osborn, and Edward May. Flower girls were: Joy Tuch, Dolores May, Mary Lucile Osborn and Illa Rae Tuch.

With Mrs. G. B. Ira at the piano, Mrs. Faye Brady sang a solo, "No Night There," and Mrs. Brady and Mrs. Florence Harris sang as duets, "In the Garden" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere."

The members of the Lynch Rebekah lodge assisted at the home preparing and serving dinner. The Eastern Star chapter was in charge of the burial services at the church. The funeral procession drove to Niobrara, where burial took place in the Niobrara cemetery near the grave of the late Mr. Crowe.

At the Niobrara cemetery the Rebekah lodge was in charge of the graveside services for the Lynch lodge, of which the late Mrs. Crowe was a member for many years. Relatives from a distance who attended the rites included: Mr. and Mrs. Tom Drayton and William Davidson, all of Orchard; James Tuch and family, of Niobrara; the Marvin and Lloyd Tuch families, of Verdigr; Edward May and family, of Monowi; Harold Osborn and family, Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Graham and Howard Graham and family, all of Dorsey.

Jane Crowe was born at Carlisle, England, on November 28, 1861. When she was a young woman she was married to Thomas J. Graham.

Mr. Graham died at Carlisle, and about the year 1887 Mrs. Graham came to the United States with her father, Isaac Davidson, and her two small children.

The family settled on a farm known as the Armstrong post office place, about nine miles northwest of Verdigr. Mrs. Graham moved from

Verdigr to a farm which she homesteaded near Dorsey. Here she was united in marriage to Tom Crowe on November 23, 1890. They lived at the homestead for a time and later moved to a ranch near the Niobrara river, which is now known as the Crowe ranch. After Mr. Crowe died in 1935, Mrs. Crowe continued to live at the ranch until failing health forced her to move to Lynch to be closer to medical aid. Here she made her home with her daughter, Mrs. George Tuch. On April 12, 1948, she entered Sacred Heart hospital where she died.

The late Mrs. Crowe was very active in community life. She was an ardent supporter of two children's homes—the Christian Home, at Council Bluffs, Ia., and the Nebraska Children's Society, at Omaha. She was a member of the Order of Eastern Star and Rebekah lodges at Lynch.

Survivors include: Daughter—Mrs. George J. Tuch, of Lynch; son—Thomas J. Graham, of Dorsey; brothers—William Davidson, of Orchard, and Joseph Davidson, of Oakridge, Calif.; six grandchildren, and 14 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by three brothers—Thomas Davidson, of Carlisle, England; John Davidson, of Southwick, S. D., and Isaac Davidson, of Willows, Calif.

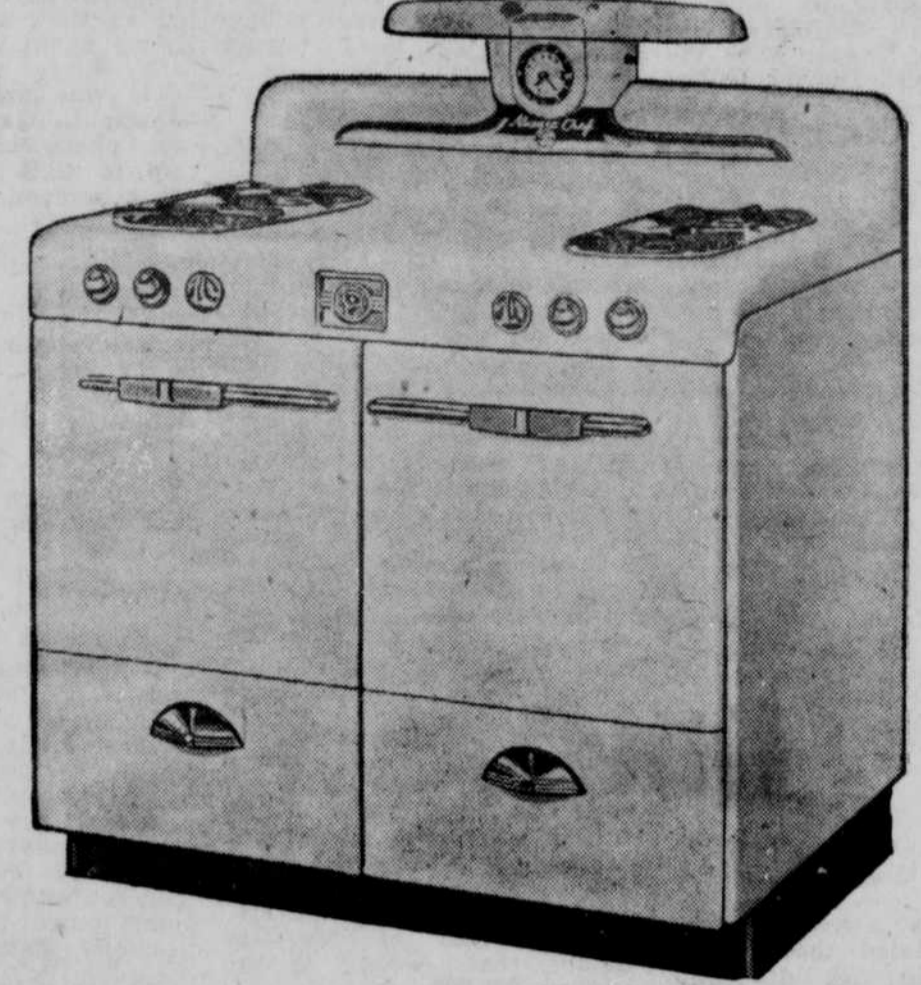
