Lawrence Welk, Band Here Monday

Lawrence Welk, boyish looking and genial maestro who brings his "name" band to the American Legion auditorium on Monday, November 29, not so many years ago was just another small town boy from the middlewest with ideas.

Today he is recognized as the creator of a new style of music that is rapidly gaining in popularity. "Champagne Music," and the leader of an orchestra which authorities on popular music recognize as one of the top musical aggregations in the country.

Radio surveys prove Lawrence Welk and his "Champagne Music" orchestra one of the favorites of the air; record sales show him to be one of the best sellers on recording; and box office receipts throughout the mid-

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west have proven that dancers and theater-goers acknowledge and want his particular brand of entertainment. Lawrence was on his way to becoming a "big name" several years ago, and then the swing craze took over the country. Having spent much time and effort in creating a light bounce and bubbly effect for his orchestra, Welk refused to change its style and compete with the many swing bands that sprang up from nowhere. Gradually, although he continued to work better spots consistently, he was lost in the shuffle of the

fad. Now, with the mode of music returning to the sweet- er side, Welk is coming into his own by leaps and bounds. Welk got his start in the dance band business while working at radio station WNAX in Yankton, S. D. He visited the O'Neill region frequently with his small organization which was aired regularly over WNAX. On his cross-country trips between engagements in the Nation's famous ballrooms and hotels and movie sets, Welk seldom misses an opportunity for one or two engagements among old friends.
