Forty-one Holt county World War II Gold Star mothers will receive Gold Star lapel buttons upon application to County Service Officer Kieth Abart.

Mr. Abart says that the list of Gold Star mothers published below is complete to the best of his knowledge, but he requests that any omissions be brought to his attention.
