## STORM SIDELIGHTS

**CHAMBERS**—Chambers and its surrounding community were cut-off from the outside world all of last week by a heavy blanket of snow and blizzard conditions. Roads, that had been opened, were drifted full and too deep for traveling even with horses.

On Saturday and Sunday, January 1 and 2, a group of men, George and Don Cameron, Erwin Carpenter, Henry Walter and Glen, Ernest and Chester Jungbluth, managed with tractors and homemade snow plowers to open the 1 1/2 miles from the Cameron place to the Highway South.

On Sunday Don Cameron took his small cousin, who had been visiting them during the holidays, to his home at Petersburg, returning late that night.

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Walter and children got to town to attend the postponed Christmas program at the Lutheran church and Mr. and Mrs. Don and Bonnie got over to the Carpenter home.

By Monday morning the road was again drifted full. The snow fell and blew for four days and there was no more traveling anywhere.

On Thursday the highway was opened West of Chambers a few miles but still no snowplow had come in from O'Neill and no mail or supplies had been received.

Some who had come for the holidays were snowed in. Among these were: Dr. and Mrs. Eason, of Louisville, Ky., at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Hubbard, and Mr. and Mrs. John Widman and daughter, of Ferndale, Wash.

No school was held in the Chambers school all week. Some of the pupils from the country had arrived in town on Sunday evening, January 2, and were unable to return home.

Miss Jones, of O'Neill, who teaches in Valley Center, district 107, came to her boarding place—the Vernon Hixon home—but was unable to get to the school. None of the pupils were able to reach the school either.

**SCOTTVILLE**—This tiny community is isolated in every sense of the word. Until Wednesday the only manner in which people could get in and out of Scottville was by horseback.

**REDBIRD**—Postmaster Peter More, who is also The Frontier's special correspondent, had a lot of company—be-feathered company, that is—during last week's storm. There was no mail to be distributed and few persons reached the postoffice, so Mr. More had ample time to scatter grain in front of the postoffice for hungry feathered friends. Birds came by the hundreds, he reports, including redbirds—the specie or which the town was named—and quail.

**INMAN**—Inman's main street resembled a frontier town Saturday when several of the farmers and ranchers made their way to town—the first time in two weeks—for provisions, fuel and mail for themselves and their neighbors.

There were all sorts of vehicles on the streets and the old hitching posts were sadly misused.

**LYNCH**—Three milk cows and a Shetland pony were killed when the weight of snow caused the roof on a shed to collapse at the Andy Classen place, located West of Lynch.

**LYNCH**—Lynch residents received their first mail in a week on Saturday, January 8. Postmaster Louis Nelson drove to Spencer for this mail.

A snowplow which had been enroute from Norfolk to Winchester, S. D., on the North Western railroad reached Lynch about 11 o'clock Sunday morning.

**LYNCH**—Interrupted rail service on the Norfolk-Winchester, S. D., branch of the North Western railroad posed a near-critical fuel problem here. Dealers reported depleted stocks of coal and nearly-depleted fuel oil supplies.

**REDBIRD**—A truckload of mail reached Redbird late Tuesday—the first mail in a week. Mail was dispatched on Monday by team and wagon to Lynch.

## REGION PARALYZED BY STORM

"laid up for repairs" in the O'Neill highway department garage, according to J. D. Osenbaugh, who is in charge.

He explained: "You can't run this heavy equipment 24 hours a day, seven days a week without having some grief."

This was the road picture in the O'Neill region late Wednesday.

Highway 275 East from O'Neill was in "very good shape" to Ewing and "fair" East of Ewing.

Highway 20 East and West from O'Neill was in "fair" condition. Earlier in the week highway 20 had been blocked both directions.

Highway 11 South from Atkinson to Burwell was opened Tuesday.

Highway 281 South from O'Neill was opened to Bartlett and Grand Island by Tuesday afternoon, although huge drifts on a seven and a half-mile stretch had kept the road closed for many hours.

Highway 281 North from O'Neill to the South Dakota line was opened early Tuesday.

Highway 12 across Boyd county was opened and reopened on several occasions. While service was disrupted on the Norfolk-Winchester, S. D., branch of the North Western, highway 12 was the lifeline for these communities.

Highway 95 was opened at least three and a half miles West of Chambers.

The Stuart-Naper road was believed open to one-way traffic.

Highway 108 from O'Neill to Page was still closed Wednesday afternoon but was to have been opened last night. A rotary snowplow, used earlier on highway 281 South of O'Neill, was to have been used in clearing 108 Wednesday night. This highway has been blocked longer than any other secondary road in the O'Neill region. Page, meanwhile, has had an outlet on 108 South to highway 20.

W. F. Grothe, Emmet farmer who was in O'Neill Wednesday, expressed concern for young shelterbelts. He observed that heavy snow and ice from early storms already were a burden on the young trees, and predicted that many trees would die from the results of additional snow and ice.
