**Postal Rates  
 Hiked January 1**

New postal rates that be-  
 came effective January 1 have  
 altered nearly all mailing rates  
 except first-class matter, Post-  
 master Agnes E. Sullivan said  
 this week.  
 Indicative of the change, air  
 mail rates will jump from five  
 to six cents an ounce and  
 special delivery rates will in-  
 crease from 13 to 15 cents on  
 first-class matter up to two  
 pounds.  
 Second-class material will  
 remain unchanged but third-  
 class mail will go from a cent  
 and a half to two cents for  
 each two ounces up to eight  
 ounces. Merchandise up to  
 eight ounces will be subject  
 to the same increase.  
 Parcel post rates have been  
 upped, with major increases in  
 rates for light packages on  
 short deliveries. Heavy pack-  
 ages for long distances are sub-  
 ject to only a slight raise in  
 rates.  
 Special handling rates will  
 increase from 10 to 15 cents  
 up to two pounds and regis-  
 tered mail will have a 25-cent  
 minimum instead of 20 cents.  
 Insurance fees will jump from  
 three cents to five cents on  
 items less than five dollars  
 and COD fees will increase  
 from 15 to 20 cents up to \$2-  
 50.  
 Money order fees will go  
 from eight cents to 10 on or-  
 ders up to five dollars and  
 postal notes up to \$10 will  
 raise from five to 10 cents.  
 A new airmail postcard is  
 being issued soon. A three-cent  
 stamp on a postcard will send  
 it airmail.

**ADMITS BREAKING  
 INTO LEGION CLUB**

**Wayne Cortez Hamm in  
 Custody Here for  
 Burglary**

Wayne Cortez Hamm, who  
 was released from the state  
 penitentiary October 9, 1948,  
 Friday at O'Neill admitted  
 breaking into the American  
 Legion club here Wednesday  
 night, January 5, and stealing  
 \$14 to \$15 in nickles from the  
 music box, according to Corp.  
 Willard Teachman of the state  
 safety patrol.

Hamm signed the confession  
 in the presence of Holt County  
 Attorney William Griffin,  
 Sheriff A. B. Hubbard, Day  
 Police Chief J. F. Wert, Cor-  
 poral Teachman and Patrolman  
 Fay Robeson.  
 Hamm, who formerly lived  
 at Chadron and Long Pine,  
 was arrested by Night Police  
 Chief Chet Calkins, after he  
 had spent a large number of  
 nickles in a billiard parlor.  
 Teachman was called to O-  
 'Neill Friday and after he had  
 fingerprinted Hamm the con-  
 fession was made.  
 Hamm served time in the  
 state prison on a break-in  
 charge in Cheyenne county.  
 He was arraigned in Holt  
 county court Saturday, before  
 Judge Louis W. Reimers, and  
 was bound over to the district  
 court.  
 He is in the Holt county jail  
 in custody of Sheriff Hubbard.

**MERCY MISSION  
 TAKES 18 HOURS**

**Doctor McKee Journeys  
 with Snowplow and  
 Lumber Wagon**

ATKINSON—This is the  
 story of a mercy mission that  
 required 18 hours to make.  
 Dr. P. N. McKee received a  
 call at 10 p. m. Saturday that  
 a Mrs. Cook was seriously ill  
 25 miles northeast of Atkin-  
 son.  
 Dr. McKee obtained the use  
 of a snowplow for the trip and  
 after six hours arrived at the  
 women's home. The last part  
 of the trip Dr. McKee made in  
 a lumber wagon.  
 Earl Coxbill, Atkinson pilot,  
 reported after a plane trip over  
 the snow-covered Niobrara  
 river valley, that he didn't  
 "see a bare spot anywhere."  
 "The drifts looked like they  
 might be over the Arctic seas,  
 except for an occasional ranch  
 house. I saw no cattle that  
 seemed to be in distress, and  
 very few evidences that peo-  
 ple had gotten very far from  
 home."  
 Mr. Coxbill also participated  
 in a mercy mission. Through  
 Dan Scott, Atkinson brand in-  
 spector, he learned that the  
 farm home of Thomas O'Con-  
 nell had burned and the fam-  
 ily was without food.  
 Because of the deep drifts,  
 the O'Connell family was un-  
 able to get into town for food.  
 Mr. Coxbill flew over the O-  
 Connell farm and dropped  
 food along with papers for per-  
 sons in that area.
