New Consumers Line in Service

Temporary connections for the new 115,000-volt Norfolk-O'Neill transmission line of Consumers Public Power district were completed about 3:30 P. M. on Sunday, January 2, and the new line placed in service.

The new line, operating temporarily at 33,000 volts, played an important part in maintaining electric service in the northern part of the state during the blizzard which hit the area last week.

When breaks occurred in other lines supplying the area, power was supplied over the new line.

In addition to providing an alternate power feeder for the area, the new line will also supply additional power from the central grid system of the Nebraska Public Power system to the O'Neill network from the East where the need for additional power to meet extreme load increases have been greatest.

The line will continue to be operated at 33,000 volts until facilities are completed at the Nebraska Public Power system substation to connect the line for 115,000 volt operation when it will be cut over to full voltage.

This line will also carry power to supply construction needs at the Ft. Randall project in South Dakota, connecting at O'Neill with a new high voltage transmission line being built by the bureau of reclamation.

It will also form a connection to bring additional power into Nebraska from the Ft. Randall Project when the project is completed and begins generating power.

Hogs Higher on Monday's Market

On shorter supply, butcher hogs Monday at Omaha sold \$1-\$1.50 higher and sows \$1-\$2 up. The hog run was down to 10,000, in contrast to 25,600 the preceding Monday. Butchers sold at \$18.75-\$21.50, sows at \$16.50-\$18, stags at \$13-\$15.

Fat cattle sold steady to 50c up, the advance mainly on better yearlings and heifers. Most with scattered loads \$27-\$31.50, steers sold at \$21-\$25.50, add head to \$26.50. Cows were steady to 25 cents up, the advance on low grades. Canners and cutters brought \$15-\$17.25 and beef cows \$17.50-\$20.25. Bulls scored a \$23.50 top, vealers \$29.

Stockers and feeders were steady at \$21-\$23.85. Fat lambs sold steady at \$23.75-\$24.50. Slaughters ewes also steady--to \$10.50, and feeder lambs unchanged at \$22.50-\$23.50.
