ALL CATTLE VALUES AT NEW HIGH FOR THE YEAR!

Heavy run of over 1,100 head of choice stockers and feeders sell readily to the season's largest crowd of buyers at further advance of \$1.00 and more a hundredweight.

★ It was easily "the best sale of the year" at the Atkinson Livestock Market auction Tuesday when a few over 1,100 cattle were sold at auction. The large pavilion was filled to overflowing with prospective buyers and it was apparent from the start that they were there to buy cattle. Cattle prices advanced again for the third successive week and are currently a full \$5 a hundred up from the low time three weeks ago. Eight carloads of yearling steers weighing from 500- to 750-pounds sold at prices ranging from \$24.50 to \$25.85 a hundredweight, while lighter steer calves sold up to \$27.50 a hundred. Choice heifer calves were in excellent demand at strong prices from \$23.50 to \$25.50 a hundred. Five carloads of two-year-old steers cleared between \$24.00 and \$24.85 a hundredweight. Yearling heifers were in light supply, but demand was excellent at \$21.00 to \$22.50 a hundred. All classes of cows and butcher cattle as well as bulls were from 25 to 50 cents higher than a week ago. Around 300 head of hogs were sold with top butchers reaching \$21.00 a hundred. Bulk of butcher hogs cleared between \$19.00 and \$20.80. Sows sold from \$15.60 to \$17.50 a hundred. Feeder pigs were in broad demand at 50 cents to \$1 up from last week.
