FINAL NOTICE To 1949 Taxpayers Before Assessment

The law makes it compulsory that you contact either this office or your precinct assessor and be assessed as of March 10 or at this office between March 10 and April 20; the Precinct Assessor while he is stationed there. Failure to do either and not be assessed at all, a special assessment is made and severe penalties imposed. Every person over 21 years old must see that he or she is assessed; those between 21 and 50 years-old, not having property, must be assessed for old age and poll tax. Those moving into the county from other places since last assessment date, must report for assessment.

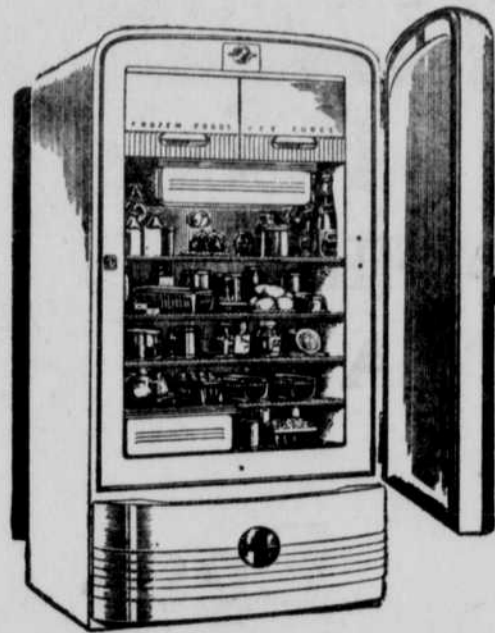
