In a deal whereby Benny sold his incorporated radio enterprises to a different radio network for \$2,260,000, the comedian was expected to be taxed only 25 per cent for capital gains on his share of the income. HOLT CONTRIBUTES \$4,174 TO RELIEF

Atkinson Minister Makes Final Statement on CROP Drive

ATKINSON—Total contributions received for the Christian Rural Overseas Program in Holt county amounted to \$4,174.13, according to Rev. E. G. Ibrig, of Atkinson, county chairman. "The campaign was practically concluded before the historic November 18 blizzard," Reverend Ibrig explained, but "resultant conditions slowed the returns, and only now are the returns complete."

Besides the Atkinson clergyman, others heading the Holt drive were: Rev. Ralph Gerber, of O'Neill, secretary and director of publicity, and Harry Snyder, of Atkinson, treasurer.

To conduct the drive, individuals were placed in charge of a precinct or precincts, as follows:

Clyde O. Cress; Paddock, East Rock Falls, Shields and North Grattan — Rt. Rev. J. G. McNamara; Iowa, Verdigris, Goding, Ewing, Deloit, East McClure and East Lake—Rev. C. Donald Vogel; South Graton, Antelope and Willowdale—Rev. V. R. Bell; Holt Creek — E. Gottschall; Francis and West Fairview—Mrs. Rudolph Dvorak; Swan, Wyoming and Josie — Mrs. N. Sageser; Coleman—Carl Damerio; Inman — Rev. Roy M. Wingate.

"All of these people did fine work," Reverend Ibrig added. "In addition there were many individuals in each precinct who carried on the actual work of solicitation."

Approximately 12 carloads of commodities were provided by the counties of district II: Rock, Boyd, Brown, Holt, Cherry, Keya Paha. The Christian Rural Overseas Program was sponsored by the Catholic Rural Life, Church World Service, and Lutheran World Relief.

Reason for this program was to provide for millions who are without the necessities of life.

Commodities and cash gifts from Nebraska in January had amounted to 254 thousand dollars. These gifts together with millions of gifts throughout the Nation formulated the largest voluntary good will gift ever assembled for overseas shipment.

"As chairman of the Christian Rural Overseas Program in Holt county, and as director for district II in Nebraska, I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the excellent cooperation in this program; also to the hundreds who did the work of outlining and soliciting — some known, many more unknown, to the press for its assistance; to the thousands who contributed to its cause," Reverend Ibrig concluded.

March 14, 1895

The governor has vetoed the change of venue bill. He says it is unconstitutional. There is a probability that it may be passed over his veto. It is said that the attorney general may attempt to try the case in Boyd county, where Barrett Scott's body was found and thus evade the veto, providing it stands. It is claimed that under Governor Holcomb's close interpretation of the constitution the murderers might go free by simply producing witnesses to prove that Scott was seen alive as he was being forced across the line out of Holt county, and was, therefore, not murdered in Holt county.

The deadly sling-shot has added another victim to its long list. One of Mose Campbell's little boys was accidentally shot in the eye by a playmate last week. Doctor Gilligan treated the wound and says while the boy will probably not lose the sight of the eye, the iris is ruptured and may never entirely recover.

The sling-shot should be suppressed by ordinance and the eternal vigilance of parents. They are a source of great amusement to the warlike youth, but at the same time they are a menace to the

well being and safety of multitudes.

45 YEARS AGO
March 10, 1904

The Republican county central committee met Monday and after discussion of the matter of holding a convention for the selection of delegates a resolution was adopted that the committee select the delegates. The Holt county delegation consists of 14 members and goes to the convention instructed for Judge Kinkaid for a re-nomination. A convention will be called later to select the delegates to the state and senatorial convention.

A prairie fire South of town did considerable damage Friday last. The fire started at the school house about 80 rods from the home of Mrs. Mary Cavanaugh. In the morning the teacher emptied the ashes from the stove outside not knowing there was fire in them. Fire caught in

the long grass and with a heavy wind from the South the flames were carried with a flash in the direction of Mrs. Cavanaugh's home. The surrounding neighborhood responded promptly and saved Mrs. Cavanaugh from being burned out. She lost seven stacks of hay, however. Messrs. Pribil and Shoemaker also lost a quantity of hay each.

A. P. Hoover, the horse man, is minus an eye since last Saturday—that is, he has the eye yet but the sight is gone. Suddenly and without warning the eye went blind.

MELTING SNOW FLOODS VALLEYS

Highway 281 traffic is expected to be restored by noon today (Thursday).

Workmen Wednesday were working on most of the damaged bridges.

The high water from the rapid thawing has damaged many bridges and culverts on

county roads. Big fight now is the mud—everlasting mud. Most county roads are impassable. During the past few weeks wherever people congregate they travel by mostly by tractor or team and wagon.

Temperature on Wednesday morning at eight o'clock was 12 degrees—coldest for the week. There were light flurries of snow in the air several times during the week.

Chicago & North Western railroad officials experienced considerable anxiety late Monday and Tuesday when flood water was lapping the rails at several points between O'Neill and Inman. Watchmen patrolled the roadbed through the night to report any damage to grade or bridges.

Monday morning's West-bound passenger-mail train ran three hours late, but most of the other North Western passenger-mail trains have been running about on schedule.

Effective at midnight next Tuesday, State Engineer F. H. Klietsch will restrict gross weights of motor vehicles to prevent, insofar as possible, further deterioration of highways that have suffered under unusual weather conditions during the past winter.

One of the roads affected will be highway 281 from O'Neill North to the South Dakota state line, and all other highways which lie West of 281 and between U. S. highway 20 and the South Dakota line.
