RECORD HEREFORD PRICE FOR BULL

Burwell Man Pays George Rowse \$1,200 for Grand Champ

The Holt County Hereford Breeders' annual Spring sale held at O'Neill on Saturday was well attended. Emil Rezac, of Tabor, S. D., judged the show. Charles Cokle, of Norfolk, was the auctioneer. Thirty-seven bulls averaged \$428 and sold for \$15,850. Seven heifers sold for \$1,735, an average of \$248.

The grand champion bull, Battle Stanway, an eight-month-old calf, was shown by Nyal Rowse, of Chambers. The reserve champion bull, J. R. S. Caldo, a short yearling, was shown by Floyd Whitaker, also of Chambers. Zane Rowse, of Chambers, exhibited the grand champion heifer, ZR Miss North Star, and the reserve champion heifer, Given Annie, was shown by George Rowse, also of Chambers.

The grand champion bull was sold to Francis Graves, of Burwell, and George Rowse, of Chambers, for \$1,200, a new record price for the Holt County Hereford Breeders. The reserve champion bull was purchased by Harold Melcher, of Page, for \$655. The C Bar M Hereford ranch, of Ewing, consigned the second top selling bull, which sold for \$900 to Fred Taylor, of Amelia. Mr. Taylor also purchased a bull consigned by Ed Krugman, of O'Neill, for \$610. S. R. Robertson, of O'Neill, sold the third top selling bull to E. A. Palmer, of Pierce, for \$720. Floyd Taylor paid \$600 for a bull consigned to Ed Krugman. Hugo Heller, of Pierce, bought a bull consigned by Floyd Whitaker, for \$500. Frank McCall, of Duff, paid \$500 for a bull consigned by C. V. Robertson, of Chambers.

Anita Nelson, of Bristow, bought the grand champion heifer for \$390. Lyle L. Best, of Wood Lake, purchased the reserve champion heifer for \$300. The Riverview Hereford ranch, of Butte, purchased five heifer calves consigned by the C Bar M Hereford ranch, of Ewing, at prices ranging from \$170 to \$230.
