

### Cattle Market Is 'Decidedly Better'

Last Thursday's livestock auction at the Fredrickson Livestock Commission company, found 381 cattle and 300 hogs on sale in a decidedly better market than a week ago. The cattle market was composed mostly of breeding cows and good quality lightweight replacement stock.

In the cattle market, good steer calves brought \$26 to \$28 with fair to good grades from \$24 to \$26. Good heifer calves were also selling from \$24 to \$26. Five hundred to 700-pound yearling steers sold at \$22 to \$24, with 500 to 700-pound yearling heifers selling from \$18 to \$22. Lightweight or quality was the deciding factor.

Good breeding cows ranged from \$170 to \$187.50 per head, while a few cows with age or of poorer quality went to the buyers at \$145 to \$165. Cannors and cutters, \$13.50 to \$15, and fat cows up to \$18, with the bulk at \$16 to \$17.

In Thursday's hog market, 200 to 250-pound top butchers sold at \$20.75 to \$22.05. The 250- to 300-pounders were selling from

\$19 to \$21; 300- to 350-pound classes, \$18.50 to \$20; 350-pound weights and up brought \$18.50. Sows ranged from \$15.50 to \$17.20, and feeder pigs sold up to \$26 per hundred.
