March 26, 1885

The cemetery meeting called on Monday evening last was very slimly attended, only a half dozen being present. E. W. Lowe is secretary. A committee consisting of Messrs. Adams, Darr and Mathews was appointed to see what could be done in securing new grounds, the present cemetery being considered altogether too small and too close to the business part of town. The meeting adjourned to meet at the county judge's office on next Monday evening, when it is sincerely hoped that there will be a general attendance. The indifference shown by those who should be interested is a sad reflection upon the village. Respect to the dead at least should cause us to make suitable provision for a burial ground. Attend the next meeting.

30 YEARS AGO  
March 25, 1909

J. A. Cowperthwaite and Sam Wolfe have undertaken to introduce the popular English game bird, the pheasant, in the country, and have four of the birds, three hens and a cockerel, for a start.

The birds were shipped in last week from York and are now at Mr. Wolf's place where they will be kept in a yard for a time and then given the liberty of the groves and fields and it is hoped that no one will try their marksmanship on them for a few seasons until they multiply in

numbers sufficient to furnish shooting.

Hence, people living down in that community want it understood that pheasant shooting will not be allowed for a season or two yet, as they are protected by a stringent game law. It is said that the pheasant multiplies rapidly and flourishes well in this climate.

W. R. Butler went over to the Rosebud country Sunday to look over the country with the view of investing in some of the lands not filed on that will be offered for sale by the government. Extensive tracts of rough unutilized land remain in the Rosebud country not taken by homesteaders in the country opened some four years ago and this will be offered for sale by the government to the highest bidder but not less than \$1 per acre.

March 30, 1939

Mrs. M. A. Biglin passed away at her home in this city Wednesday afternoon at 12:30 after an illness of several years incident to advancing years, at the age of 80 years, one month and nine days. Funeral services will be held Friday morning from the Catholic church of which deceased had been a life-long member. With the death of Mrs. Biglin the oldest resident of this city has passed. She had been a resident of O'Neill for 60 years. Her entire life was devoted to her loved ones and she raised a splendid family of loving sons and daughters. Survivors include: eight children, several grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. The Frontier joins the many friends of the family in extending sympathies to them in the hour of their bereavement.
