Last Week's Cattle Market Brisk Here

Last Thursday's cattle market in O'Neill was brisk with all classes moving at figures comparing steady with the market the week before. This was announced by James G. Fredrickson, manager of the Fredrickson Livestock Commission company.

Two hundred eighty-seven head of cattle and 288 head of hogs were sold during the St. Patrick's day auction.

Fat cows were 50 cents to \$1 lower, following the decline of the last few days on fat cattle.

Buyers were plentiful and could easily have absorbed another 500 cattle.
Cattle prices were as follows: Choice calves, 350 to 500 pounds, \$26.50 to \$28.80; fair kind steers, \$25.50 to \$27; common steer calves, \$23 to \$25; choice heifers, \$25 to \$27; fair heifer calves, \$24 to \$26; common heifer calves, \$22 to \$24; 600- to 800-pound steers, \$21.50 to \$24; yearling heifers, \$19.50 to \$22.50; feeding cows \$17 to \$19; breed-

ing cows, \$17 to \$20; fat cows, \$16.50 to \$19; bulls, \$18 to 20.
Hog market: 200- to 240-pounds, 20.80 to \$21.40; 240- to 270-pounds, \$20.70 to \$21.20; 240- to 270-pounds, \$20.70 to \$20.50; heavy butchers, \$18.50 to \$19.75; sows 400-pounds and down, \$16.50 to \$17.25; sows over 400-pounds, \$16 to \$17.
