

NEW THREAT OF FLOOD LOOMS

small communities are virtually isolated by mud, snow and water.

On state highway 11, near the William Fryrear place in the Amelia vicinity, farmers are kept busy pulling vehicles through the low spot with tractors. A bridge South of Atkinson on highway 12 was washed out by Monday's high water.

Traffic on U. S. highway 20 East from O'Neill is being routed on highway 108, a detour through Page. Approaches to a highway 20 bridge, a mile East of the junction of highways 20 and 275, near Inman, were washed out Tuesday by flood water only a few inches below the high of 1947.

John D. Osenbaugh, O'Neill resident engineer with the state highway department, said Wednesday that the road would be closed for at least two weeks. Traffic resumes on highway 20 at the junction of highways 20 and 108, South of Page.

Holt county's soil is practically saturated, County Agent A. Neil Dawes said. "The soil hasn't been able to take care of the moisture we've had earlier," he explained. "Most of this new moisture is bound to run off."

Glea H. Wade, of O'Neill, chairman of the Holt county disaster preparedness committee, has been eyeing the Elkhorn and its tributaries carefully and is ready to put emergency machinery into action if flood conditions develop. Airmen report that the O'Neill region is a land of lakes.

Bright spot on the weather topic is the condition of the soil for hay and bluegrass crops and early pastures. Conditions right now are ideal, observers say, except that there are so many variable factors that can enter the picture.

This latest twist in the weather is bound to work a hardship on cattlemen in caring for the new crop of calves.

Cold is not a threat to the calves, they say, but the dampness and cold combined can cause pneumonia and diseases such as scours.

Train and bus schedules were interrupted by Wednesday's storm.

Until 8 o'clock Wednesday morning precipitation in O'Neill during March neared the three-inch mark. Normal for the month is 1.28-inches.

Snow, Rain Conspire to Hold Down Stock Receipts at Atkinson

Only 530 Cattle and 108 Head of Hogs on Offer; Hogs Sell \$1.00 Lower and Cattle About Steady with a Week Ago.

Some more of the same—snow, rain, mud, and bad roads—were the villains that raised hob with livestock receipts at last Thursday's auction in Atkinson. With but a few over 600 head of all classes of livestock on sale, the auction was concluded by 4 p. m. Although hog prices followed the sharp break at leading packing centers and sold a full \$1.00 lower, there were sufficient buyers present looking for cattle to hold prices fully at par with last week. Not too many straight loads of

cattle were on sale. A load of 950-pound feeder steers sold at \$24.05 with a part load of 600-pound steers reaching \$25.50 for the day's top. Fifty head of 465-pound heifers cleared at \$24.40 a hundred, 22 head of bred 2-year-old heifers went at \$164 a head, while 10 head of breeding cows commanded \$185 a head. Feeding cows, fleshy heifers and butcher cattle were in good demand with prices in line with last week's market. 47 adv.
