called here by the death of Winifred Lee.

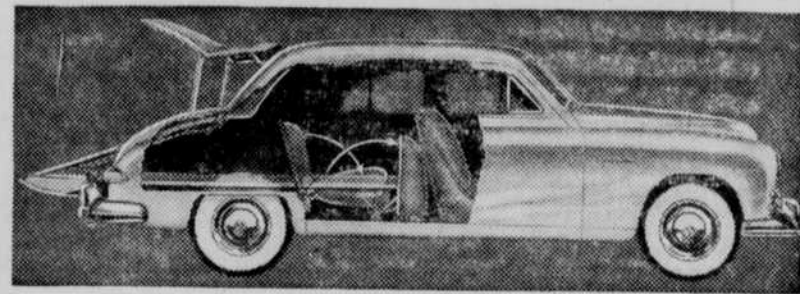
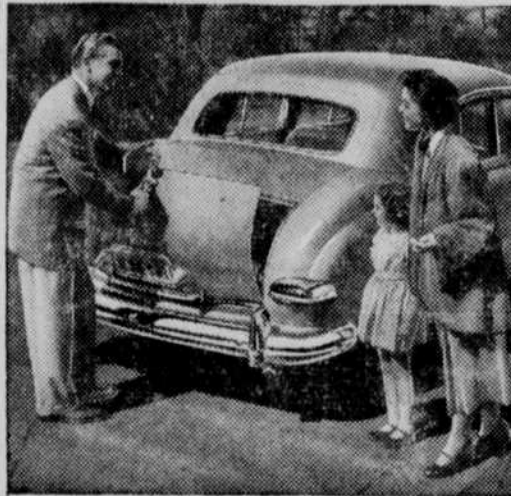
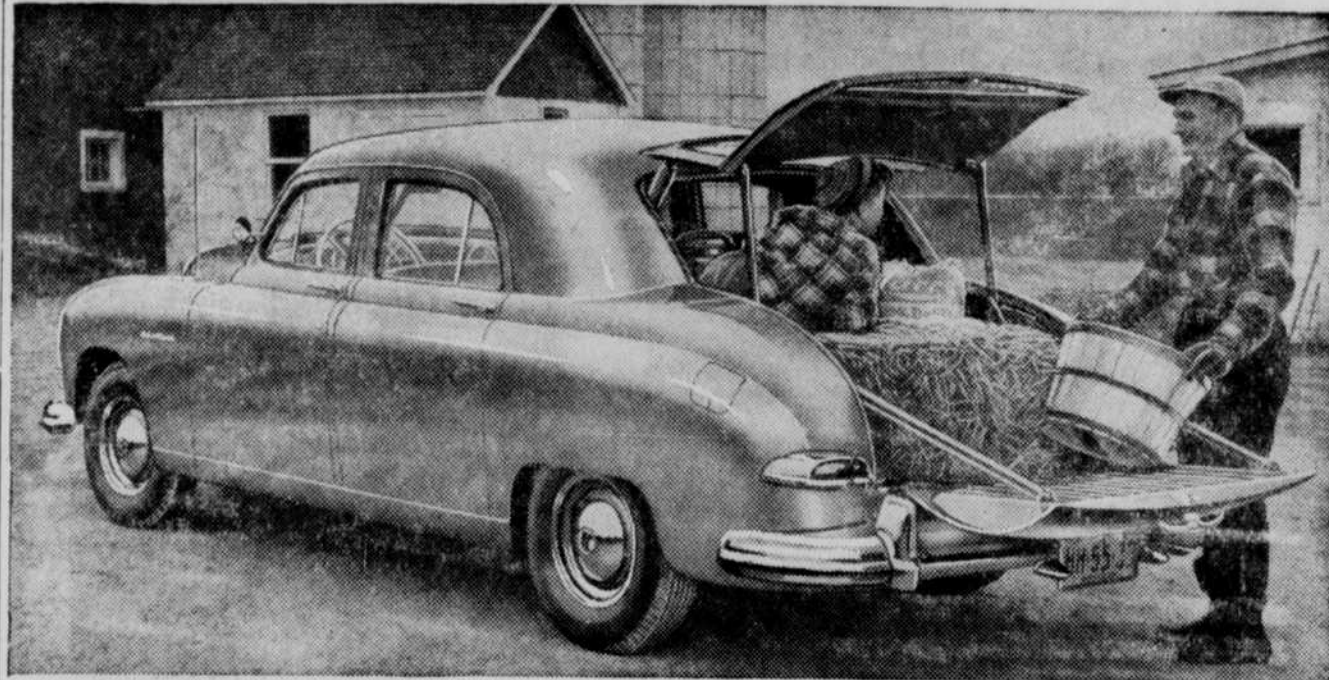
