PMA DEADLINE NOW APRIL 30

15-Day Extension on Signups Due to Storms and Bad Roads

Due to the bad road and weather conditions that have prevailed for the past month to six weeks, an extension of time has been obtained for signing farm plans for 1949 agriculture programs, by the Holt County PMA committee.

This was announced Wednesday by Harry E. Ressel, chairman of the Holt committee.

The new deadline date is April 30. Further extensions of time cannot be granted. Ressel said: "It is felt that with this additional time every operator wishing to sign will have had an opportunity to do so. In view of this extended time meetings will not now be held in precincts where original meetings as scheduled were postponed."

This applies to the following precincts—Scott, Steel Creek, Rock Falls, Saratoga and Coleman. It will be the responsibility of each operator or owner to contact the county office before April 30, to sign if he has not already done so, Ressel added.
