

**St. John's Church
Scene of Tasler-
Addison Nuptials**

Rev. E. G. Ihrig, pastor of the church, performed the double-ring ceremony in the presence of a large number of relatives and friends.

The altar was decorated with bouquets of pink gladioli in pink-and-green vases. Streamers of pink and green crepe paper were fastened to the pews along the aisle. Preceding the ceremony, Jeanne Butterfield, a senior of Atkinson high, sang "My Happiness," a favorite of both the bride and the bridegroom, and "The Lord's Prayer." She was accompanied at the piano by Bonnie Humphrey, who also played the nuptial music.

The bride entered the church on the arm of her father. Her gown was of white sheer marquisette, floor-length, with a high neck and a wide ruffled yoke edged with valencia lace.

The skirt was fashioned with a peplum, also edged with lace, as was her fingertip veil which was held by a tiara of orange blossoms and lace. Her white mitts were of net, coming to a point on her wrist. Her only jewelry was at three-strand string of pearls, a gift of the bridegroom.
