

## BUSINESS CENSUS GETS UNDERWAY

Thomas J. Sullivan Heads Task in 5-County District

Thomas J. Sullivan, of O'Neill, has been appointed a business census enumerator by the U. S. district census officer, E. Palmer Murphy, of North Platte. Sullivan will conduct the business census in a five-county area including Holt, Boyd, Keya Paha, Brown and Rock counties.

Enumerators are now starting to call on businessmen in O'Neill on a small scale in connection with the training period, currently in progress. In this connection, Mr. Sullivan asks the full cooperation of businessmen who are contacted, since the business census taken during the training period will be official.

There are 22 counties in the North Platte district. The population census will be taken immediately after January 1, 1950. Preparation and training, however, will be made late this year.

**Trade Perks Up on Run of 1,000 Head at Atkinson**

Attendance Light, But All Are Buyers; Light Steers Sell Up to 28.50 a Hundredweight.

It was a very active cattle market at last Tuesday's auction in Atkinson, with nearly 1,000 head of choice quality cattle on sale. Although attendance was rather light, nearly all were buyers and competition ruled keen, particularly on replacement steers and bred cows and heifers. Feeding figures did not fare so well and in instances looked a little lower from a week ago. The quality of the offering was generally good to choice. Top of the day was made on a load of lightweight angus steer calves at \$28.50 a hundred, the heifer mates sold at \$26.25. The bulk of the replacement weanlings sold in a range of \$24.00 to \$27.50 for steers and from \$20.00 to \$23.50 for heifers. Heavier steers from 700- to 850-pounds average cleared at \$22 to \$24 a hundred, with the medium kinds around \$20 to \$21.50 a hundred. Cows and calves sold at \$165 to \$190 a head. There was an excellent demand for wet cows and heifers at figures ranging from \$16 to \$18.75 a hundred, while bulls sold at \$16.50 to \$19 a hundred. Both angus and hereford breeding bulls sold from \$275 to \$400 a head.

Hog receipts were light at less than 100 head. Best butchers sold from \$17 to \$18 a hundred. Heavier weights from \$14 to \$14.50 a hundred.

52 Lots Average \$350 in Hereford Sale At Butte

**BUTTE**—Whitaker & Whitaker, of Chambers, received \$700 for a bull Tuesday in the Niobrara Valley Hereford show and sale held here. Purchaser was Joseph Wadsworth, of Spencer.

The top 25 bulls in the sale averaged \$510. Fifty-two lots were sold, including 44 bulls and eight females, and the average was \$350.

"Bidding was keen up until the very end," according

to Walter Sire, secretary of the Niobrara Valley association and Boyd county agent.

Joe Jelinek exhibited the grand champion bull, which sold for \$620. A good-sized crowd was on hand for the judging and selling, including a number of South Dakota buyers.
