on Small Grain Delivery A resealing program has been announced on wheat, oats and barley by the Holt county AAA committee. Farmers with grain sealed will be paid or storing it on their farms at the following rates: wheat, 10³/₄ cents; bar-

ley, 10 cents; oats, 8 cents. Storage payments will be made if grain is stored on farms until April 30, 1950. A resealing program may be announced on corn in the near future, officials said. Closing date for obtaining loans and purchases agreements on corn is June 30, 1949. Application for loans should be in the Holt office about two weeks before closing dates as loans have to be completed by June 30.
