Dear Editor:
In answer to O'Neill Shopper's letter from Atkinson. We, too, think O'Neill has very nice shopping facilities, and we surely take our share of the bargains, but we usually do our shopping in the day time, and even then, find it hard to find parking space on Saturdays.

But Atkinson Shoppers, you should consider that if you were the ones who were latest to those parking spaces and found them all full, and had to do your shopping just the same, what would you do? You would double park too, I'll bet. Especially now, that Spring is here, most farmers do their main shopping in the evening, and work during the day, so must park someplace to do that shopping when out-of-towner's or even the town cars are parked at the curb until there is no parking space left.
