Most Stockers and Feeders Sell Higher

Lightweight Cattle in Excellent Demand on Active Market at Atkinson with Top of \$29.10 Paid for 350 Pound Steer Calves. Prices Generally \$1 Higher from a Week Ago.

With cattle receipts showing seasonal contraction, only a few over 500 head of cattle were on sale at Atkinson Tuesday, May 17. With no letup in demand, it was a most active market and prices generally ruled from \$1 to \$2 a hundred higher than a week ago.

Top of the day was made on 15 head of steer calves at \$29.10 with other steers weighing from 350 to 500 pounds average going at \$25 to \$27 a hundred. Heifer calves in the light yearling class cleared at \$23.50 to \$27 a hundred, heavier weights from \$21.50 to \$24 a hundred. Fleshy 900 pound steers brought \$23.50 while some 700 pound weights sold from \$24 to \$24.50 a hundred.

Feeding cows cleared at \$17.50 to \$19.50 a hundred; canners at \$13 to \$14, and cutters from \$14 to \$17 a hundredweight.

Hog receipts were 240 head with a top on light butchers at \$18.75. Other weights sold between \$17 and \$18.50 a hundred. No feeder pigs were offered.
