## Fredrickson Cattle Market Slower

Two hundred and fifteen cattle and 438 hogs were marketed Thursday, June 9, at the regular sale at the Fredrickson Livestock Commission Co., in O'Neill.

In the cattle market, good yearling steers sold from \$23.50 to \$25, with yearling heifers bringing \$20 to \$22.50. Stock cows brought from \$15 to \$18; fat cows, \$17 to \$19 with bulls selling from \$19.50 to \$20.60.

Fat heifers brought \$19 to \$23 with no heavy steers to test the market.

Fat hogs, 200- to 250-pounders from \$20.50 to \$21; 250- to 270-pounders \$19.50 to \$20.50; 270- to 300-pounders \$19 to \$19.50; 300- to 350-pounders \$17 to \$19. Light sows brought \$18.55 down with heavy sows \$15 to \$16.50.

Stags sold for \$12 to \$13.50; wet sows \$17 to \$18.50. Pigs went for \$15 to \$19 per head with some small ones at \$13 to \$15.

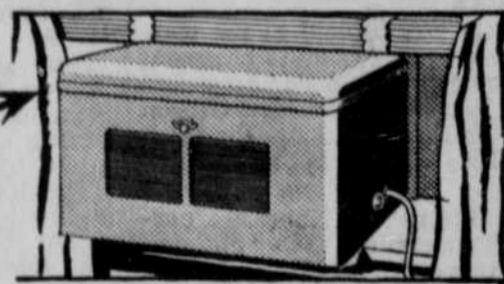

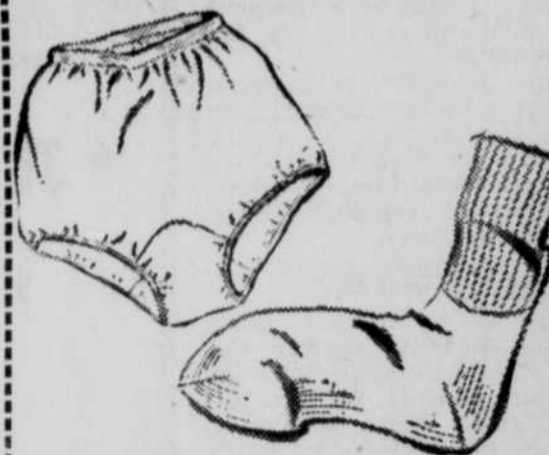
