Then set your oven for the proper heat, assemble all the ingredients listed in the recipe, and get the utensils you will use in mixing everything from the baking. Now you're all set. Measure just as carefully as if the ingredients were medicine and you'll have better results.

You can save yourself a good many steps by learning to use your head when going about baking and daily work of other kinds, too.

That quake was number "seven" in intensity. The latest one was number eight number 12 is disaster. I sent an air mail letter to my girl friend, the last time the wires were simply flooded for days. The paper said that on the same day an earthquake was recorded in Nebraska but no one felt it.

Mortenson Wins Golf Tourney

Kermit Mortenson of Albion, is 1949 king of the O'Neill open golf tournament. He defeated Harold Johnson, of Norfolk, 3 and 2 at the 16th hole to cop the tournament played at the Country club course here.

The three-day annual event opened Sunday with 76 entries teeing off in the qualifying round.

Champ Mortenson defeated Bill Montgomery, of O'Neill, in the first round of the flight 2 and 1 and then went on to eliminate Gene McKenna, of O'Neill, 1 up, in the second. In the third round, Mortenson won from George Lightner, of St. Edward, thus meeting Johnson for the title.

The consolation flight was won by Pug Horn, of Grand Island, from Paul Kubitchek, of O'Neill, 1 up on the 20th.

An interesting sidelight in the championship flight consolation round saw Horn making his second shot on No. 11 from the front seat of a refreshment truck. On his previous try, a healthy slice sent the ball toward the truck. It bounced and landed in the driver's seat.

First flight winner, H. J. Lohaus, defeated Joe McCarville, Jr., 4 to 2 on the 16th hole. Lohaus eliminated L. E. Mason, of Plainview, in the first round in first flight play, then knocked Dr. Williams, of Decatur, from the running. In the third round, Lohaus poured it on to eliminate Ben Grady, thus meeting McCarville.

McCarville was 1 up on Lohaus on the 11th but faded away quickly on the last four.

Jim Golden, of Omaha, defeated Pat Harty, of O'Neill, to cop the first flight consolation bracket.

Norm Gonderinger, of O'Neill, defeated Fred Jungman, of Atkinson, 1 up.

Gonderinger eliminated Dale Kersenbrock in the first round then knocked John Hospodaka, of Plainview, from the running, and in the third round put Tut McKee on his list of defeated golfers. Winning from McKee enabled Gonderinger to get at Jungman in the finals of the second flight.
