Fredrickson Cattle Market Lower

Three hundred cattle and 400 hogs were marketed Thursday, June 16, at the regular sale at the Fredrickson Livestock Commission Co., in O'Neill.

Steers and feeder cows took the bulk of the decline with the best yearling steers bringing \$24, mostly \$22.50 to \$23.50. The heavier yearlings sold for \$22 down. Feeding cows brought \$14.50 to \$16 with canners and cutters bringing \$12.75 to \$14. Fat cows sold up to \$19.

Butcher hogs topped at \$21.15, mostly \$20.50 per hundred weight, with heavier weights on down below \$20 according to weight. Sows sold for \$16.50 and down, with real heavy sows below \$14.
