DEATH TAKES MRS. FAIRBANKS

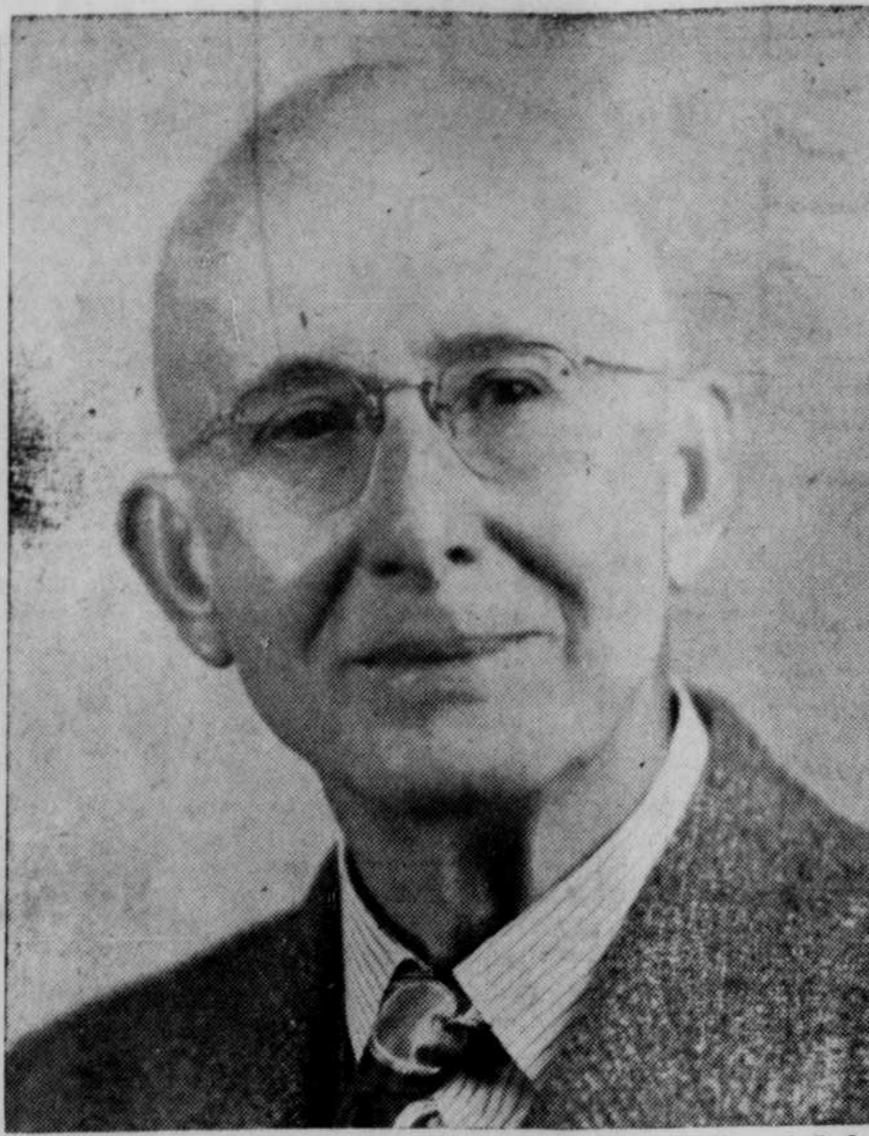
CHAMBERS — Rev. Lawrence McElhannon officiated at the funeral services for Mrs. Edith M. Fairbanks, 78, of Chambers, held from the Baptist church here at 2 p. m. Friday.
Mrs. Fairbanks had been ill about three weeks prior to her death, on June 23, at the home of her son, L. W. Taggart, of Chambers.
She came from her birthplace, Roanoke, Va., with her parents in 1879 and homesteaded on a farm South of Ewing.
In 1897 she married Samuel Taggart at Ewing and to them three sons were born.
For nine years after her husband's death in 1916, she, with the aid of the sons, operated the family farm Northwest of Chambers.
Mrs. Fairbanks moved to Lincoln in 1925 to afford her

sons the opportunity of attending the University of Nebraska. While in Lincoln she was house mother for the Farm House fraternity for two years.
In February of 1929 she married Loveland L. Fairbanks, of Kimball. Mr. Fairbanks passed away in 1948.
Survivors include: Sons—Paul F. Taggart, of Stuttgart, Germany; Dr. S. Rose Taggart, of Washington, D. C.; and Louis W. Taggart, of Chambers; nine grandchildren and a brother—Franklin H. Smith, of Riverdale, Md.
Mr. and Mrs. Leo Adams, Mrs. Letha Cook, and Robert Turner sang hymns.
The body was taken to Omaha for cremation.

Homer O. Campbell, whose interesting stories will be found in section C of this Diamond Jubilee number of The Frontier, spent his boyhood in O'Neill. His first job was driving a bread wagon at about \$5 a month and meals. As he tells elsewhere he became a disciple of Ben Franklin, printer, through the patience and long-suffering of Harry Mathews, a brother of the versatile Doc, who founded The Frontier.

After leaving O'Neill, Mr. Campbell was employed in the composing room of the Sioux City Journal. Later went to Walla Walla, Wash., was promoted from linotype operator to city editor of The Daily Union. From Walla Walla he went to Seattle, became prominent in the printing and publishing industry through the Pacific coast states. One of Mr. Campbell's published works, "The Net-Worth Tax," a study in taxation, was used as a text book in the University of Wisconsin. Another, "Socialized Money," found its way into a number of foreign countries, including Japan and Russia. The late war held up the publication of another work, "Debts Bar the Way." Mr. Campbell, now treading on the verge of four score years, has under way another literary production, a portion of which he is giving to our readers in this issue. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell are at home at 1525 45th Ave., SW, Seattle.
