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During harvesting, threshing and haying seasons, telephone wires serving a community are sometimes broken when they become caught on combines, threshers, hay stackers, etc., which are being moved beneath the wires. This usually happens along the sides of fields where no special provision has been made for wire clearance, as is done for driveways and highway crossings.

If you are moving machinery which may be high enough to strike telephone wires and you need assistance to get proper clearance, please call the telephone manager.

It is especially important to telephone users that service should not be interrupted during the busy harvest season. Your cooperation in avoiding wire breaks will be greatly appreciated.

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
