Two or three flags hung limp in the hot Fourth of July sunshine yesterday where I spent the day, over the radio was heard voices lifted in song, "My country, 'tis of thee," patriots ignored police regulations and let go the boom of firecrackers at intervals. There are some things city ordinances and police threats cannot control. The memories of Trenton and Valley Forge transcend any local restrictions. The state fire marshal gave up and conceded the situation was "out of hand." Maybe it's a good sign, a warning, don't go any farther in an effort to take away the liberty of the people.
