EWING—A pleasure trip ended tragically Tuesday for a Ewing family a mile and a half East of here on Highway 275 according to Pay Robeson, State highway patrolman.

John Ruther, 44, and his wife were in the cab of their pickup truck with the children in the back when the truck hit a rough spot in the road. The truck apparently went out of control and hit a tree, skidding over it,
