

Fredrickson's Cattle Market Steady

Two hundred and fifty cattle and 377 hogs were sold at the Fredrickson livestock commission company here last Thursday.

Cattle market was steady to strong on all classes. Buyers were plentiful and receptive to all classes of cattle. The best yearling steers brought at \$22.50. Mostly \$21 to \$21.50. Common to poor ones went at \$17.50 to \$20.10. Yearling Heifers topped at \$20. There were no choice packages on hand. The heavier kind sold at \$17 to \$19 and the lighter ones above \$19. There weren't enough calves on hand to test the market. Fat cows cleared \$15.25 down to \$13. Canners and cutters \$10 to \$13. Bulls \$18.50 and down.

The hog market follows: top butchers \$22.60. Mostly \$22.45; 250-300 pounders 20.50 to \$22; light sows \$19.50 to \$20.50; sows 325 to 400 pounds \$17.50 to \$19; 600 pound sows were down to \$14.
